
CONCRETE ADVICE



How to Install **Solid Posts** and Poles.

The most secure way to anchor a post in the ground is to use concrete. Your fence will stand straight longer, flagpoles and clothesline umbrellas will resist toppling. You can also use concrete to anchor backyard play equipment such as swingsets, slides and monkey bars. They become tip-proof and therefore safer and more fun for the children to play on.

follow the outdoor equipment manufacturers suggestions for the size of hole required. The diameter of the hole should provide enough clearance all around the post or pole for pouring concrete. The buried ends of steel or aluminum posts should be coated with bituminous paint to prevent corresion.

The most common fence post used in Canada is a 4 inch by 4 inch wooden post. It is recommended that you purchase posts that are pretreated with a preservalive to prevent rotting or coal them yourself. Hand augers outmally dig holes 6 inches in diameter whereas power augers dig 8 inch diameter holes which are better (and a lot easier on you).


The hole should be deep enough to allow 1/3 of the length of the post to be encased. This depth of hole generally does not go below the frost line so the bottom of the hole should be flared out a few inches into a bell shape. (see illustration) so that the frost is less likely to heave the post.

Digging the hole: You should A Installing the fence post: Place 6 inches of crushed stone or gravel in the bottom of each hole to allow for drainage and prevent rotting. To align the wood post set two stakes next to the hole and fasten a one inchbrace to each stake with a single nail. Set the post in the hole, get it vertical with a level and nail the braces to the post (see illustration).

> Mix 2 bags of Sakrele® Concrete Mix for each hole. This is a blended concrete mix in a bag and is available from your local building supplies retailer. Using a rod or stick, force the concrete down and around the post in succeeding 30 cm (12") to 35 cm (15") layers Proceed until the hole is filled.

> Finishing the job: Mound the concrete up around the post to about 5 cm (2") above ground level and slope the top down towards the ground. Allow the concrete to strengthen for a day or two before removing the braces and attaching fencing. Keep the concrete damp during this period.






