# The true classics can be seen Sunday

No other North American car so captured the public's fancy. A "Duesy" was a hounding, a word that implied superlative. To have such a flattering phrase injected into conversations must have brought smiles to the Duesenberg brothers. They were responsible for those inspiring vehicles.

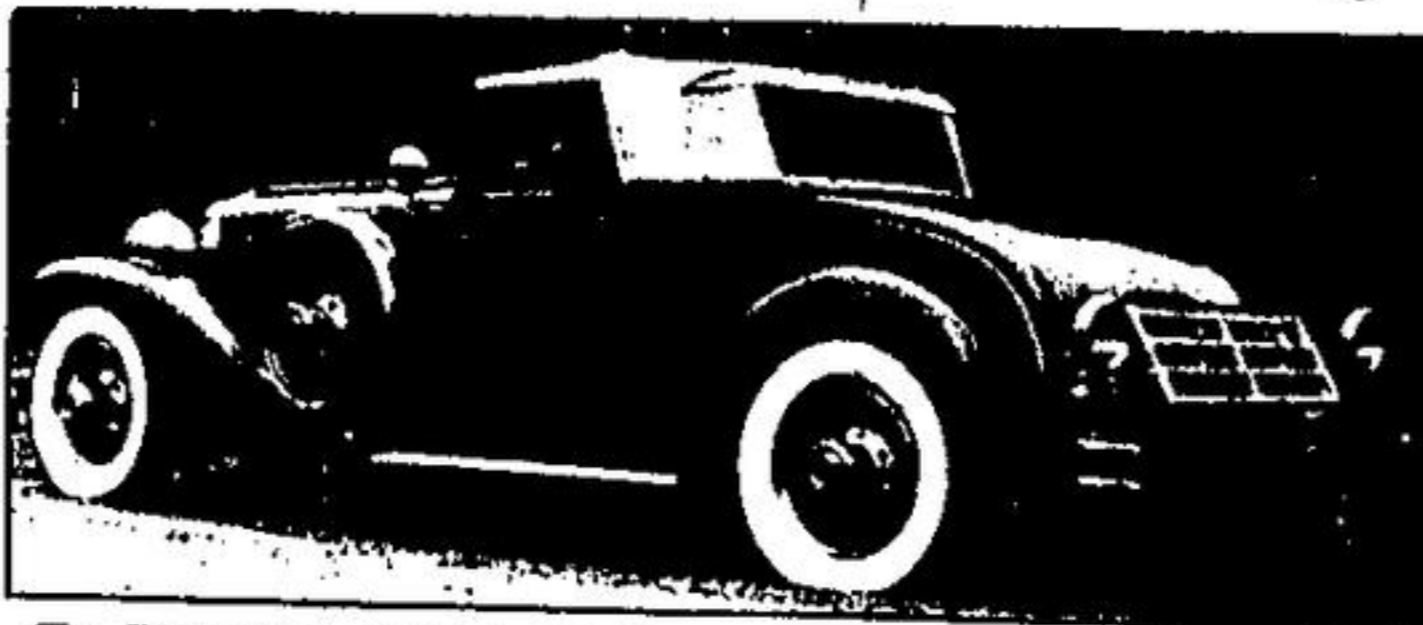
The year 1928 was the birth year of the Duesenberg Model J, until very recently the fastest large luxury car ever built. Power was from a straight eight, of 5.9 litres, twin overhead camshafts and four valves per cylinder, producing an advertised whopping 265 horsepower. The chassis could be pressed to 119 mph in top gear and 89 mph in second! Remember or imagine if you can't remember the average car of the period had a top speed of about 70 mph.

And the coachwork! To quote C. Posthumus who puts it quite nicely: "The J certainly rates amongst the world's finest and most beautiful cars. Its appearance was magnificent, with an elegant vee radiator

with vertical slats, and bodies by the finest American coachbuilders such as Derham, Le Baron and Murphy and by the great European 'carrossiers'."

The "J" on display at the Classics Against Cancer Auto Show in Georgetown on Sunday is one of 485 built and has a coachwork built by "Murphy". It, like all "J's", was designed and manufactured without compromise to be the finest automobile in the world. Custom body features could be specified by the purchaser. Since anything available could be ordered there were seldom two cars alike. The body is hand formed aluminum and the chassis molybdenum-steel. Bodied in Pasadena California, and delivered to New York in 1929 in the same month as the stock market crash this car would have cost around \$17,500-\$18,000, approximately the price of two Rolls Royce automobiles or 35 model A Ford roadsters.

This car is owned by Mr. Terry



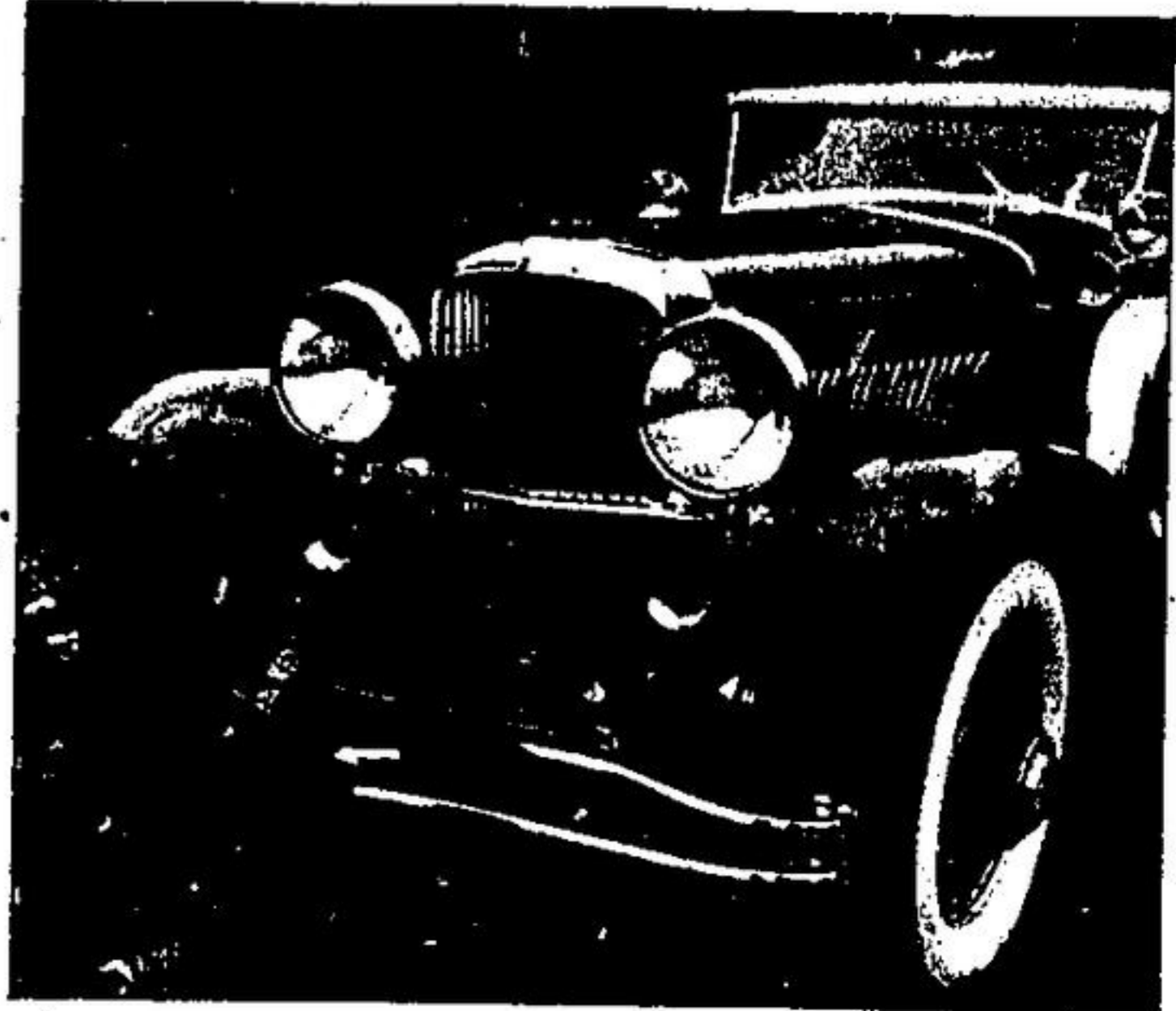
The Duesenberg Model J was the epitome of fine automobiles in its era. The Classics Against Cancer Auto Show Sunday at Cedarvale
