First impressions count

Approaching a potential employer for the first time can be difficult. It does get easier with practice. For your summer job search remember that first impressions are very important when approaching an employer. A positive attitude and

common sense will go a long way in helping you to make that good first impression.

An employer can be contacted in person, by telephone or by letter. When telephoning an employer always have a pad of paper and a

pen handy. Make the call and ask for the contact person by name. Introduce yourself and explain that you are calling with regards to a particular job. Ask if you can meet with him/her to discuss the position at a time convenient for the employer. Do not forget to ask for specific directions to the job location and then thank the employer for his/her time.

When approaching a potential employer in person, which incidentally is one of the best ways to obtain a job, there are a few things to keep in mind in order to make a positive first impression:

- Smile; be pleasant.
- Be prepared to shake hands using a fairly firm grasp.
- Maintain eye contact and do not wear dark glasses.
- Enthusiasm is very important.
- Think about what you have to offer the employer.

- Listen carefully to the employer and think before you speak.
 - Body language says a lot; be calm and poised, sit up straight and do not fidget.
 - Do not take your friends with you.
 - Do not smoke or chew gum!
 - Do not be late and thank the employer for his/her time.
- Remember, above all, an employer wants someone reliable, honest, prompt and willing to learn.

Your personal appearance will be an important factor in the impression you leave. Expensive clothing is not necessary but being neat, clean and tidy is imperative. It is a good idea to have your hair trimmed and make sure your clothes are pressed. Avoid trendy clothes, as an employer may not always appreciate some of the new fashion fads. When in doubt it is best to dress on the conservative side. Better yet is to be aware of how people dress at

the particular work place and follow their cue. Go easy on the make-up and perfume/cologne and avoid tight clothes, wild colors and flashy jewelry.

The overall first impression that you leave with an employer is a very important factor in whether you are hired or not. If you are neat, clean, polite and enthusiastic you will probably make a positive initial impression. This shows an employer that you are willing to put the time and effort forth for him/her and that you are genuinely interested in working.

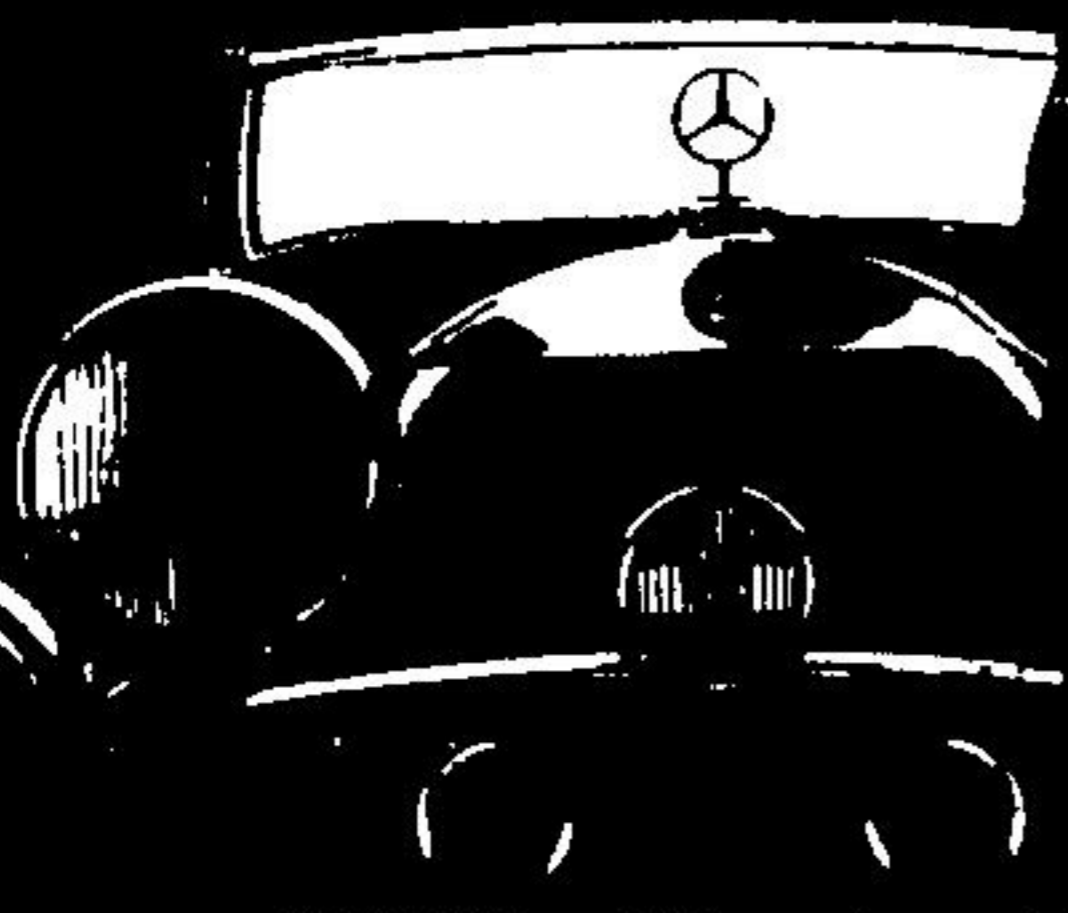
