#### Freeze your flour to keep bugs away

DEAR POLLY — The whole-wheat flour I buy gets bugs in it after a while. What should I be doing to prevent this? - D.S.

DEAR D.S. — The best place to store whole-wheat and other wholegrain flours is the freezer. This will

not only prevent insect infestation, but it will also keep the flour from turning rancid. Whole-grain flours are bigher in fat than refined white flour, so they tend to spoil much more quickly.

I store all my whole-grain flours in the freezer, especially those that I'm not likely to use up so quickly, to make sure they stay fresh and free of bugs. This includes cereals that I buy in bulk and store for long periods bulgur, rolled oats, cornmeal, rice floor, rye floor, kasha, wheat bran, etc. Wheat germ, however, should be stored in the refrigerator, not the freezer. Freezing can destroy its vitamin E content.


