Golden Age crowns on line

More than 25,000 Canadians over the age of 60 in the provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Northern Ontario, Southern Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia participate in the lifetime activity of bowling. This sport provides regular moderate exercise, requires no extreme physical exertion and has its own annual Golden Age National Championships. In the many years of five pin bowling this is only the third time that this national event has come to Southern Ontario, and Georgetown was awarded the honor of hosting this championship.

The opening ceremonies and competition on Sunday, June 26 are also open to spectators and will take place at Georgetown Bowl, 12 Mountainview Road South from 10 a.m. with "Pete" Pomeroy and "Russ" Miller, the Regional Chairman and Municipal Mayor, rolling the first competitive balls. The Canadian finalist teams, both men and ladies will then take over and demonstrate their expertise. Three games will be bowled, followed by a lunch break

and an afternoon session from 1:15 p.m. At 4:30 p.m. all competitors depart for a tourist trip to Toronto visiting such scenes as the Harbour Front, the CN Tower, the new Dome Site, and Ontario Place.

On Monday, June 27 the championship bowling activity will commence at the centre from 11 a.m.

The public is urged to join Georgetown in welcoming our out-of-province guests to show them our true local, friendly hospitality.

All Golden Age bowlers, regardless of ability, have the opportunity to become champions. Since January thousands of senior citizens vied for championship honors in four phases. The top three men and the top three ladies were declared as House Champions from their participating centres across Canada based on the highest pins-over-average format. These teams continued to the Zone level and then the winners took part in the Provincial championships. Now comes the climax in Georgetown, the Canadian National championships.
