TSN Skins Game

Local bowler looking to strike gold

Bill Anderson of Georgetown is hoping his prowess on the bowling lanes can help earn him some big money in the near future.

Anderson is one of 16 Ontario bowlers who will vie for over \$15,000 in prize money in the second ever TSN five-pin Skins Game competition. Provincial semi-finals will be held in the new year with winners advancing to a Canada-wide final. all to be taped for viewing on The Sports Network.

"It's based on the skins game in golf," said Anderson after winning the western Ontario five-pin competition in Cambridge recently. "The score doesn't count for much. it's based on frame by frame competition."

Anderson bested 44 other bowlers in capturing the western Ontario skins title. He hopes to continue his streak into the semi-finals. Frames are worth \$50 in the preliminary rounds and rise to \$400 in the finals

and Anderson figures the overall winner could collect a tidy \$6,000 for a day on the lanes.

"It'll be a close competition," said Anderson of the upcoming semi-

finals. "Fraser Hambly, the eastern Canadian champ, will be there. He's beaten me and I've beaten him. There are also a lot of really good young bowlers competing."

Anderson, who has been rolling the five pins down for over 25 years. has enjoyed much competitive suc

cess since returning to the alley after a 10-year hiatus from the sport about 12 years ago. This year alone

the local bowler figures he's made about \$2,500 in various tournaments and competitions. He said some of

the fringe benefits of winning a tournament are also attractive. "I won an all-expense paid trip to compete in the Molson Open in Saskhtoon," said Anderson, citing one example.

Of his layoff, Anderson said he was just, "playing too much," and needed a break from the lanes. "I was also having a bad year so it was a good time to leave for a while," he quipped.

Currently, Anderson bowls at Brampton Bowl about two times a week. He says he bowls about 10 tournaments a year and will con-

sider a return to the coaching ranks once his competitive commitments case up.

"I coached for about six or seven years a while back," he said. "But right now I want to concentrate on my own game."

For Anderson, whose personal high score is a 435, that concentration would ideally pay off with a TSN Skins Game title win in 1989.


Game four: Georgetown 15 Clarkson 5

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
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
