Local hoopster nets entry into WLU Hall of Fame

Georgetown resident Kyra Kristensen-Irvine says she was booked on basketball the first time she saw the ball bounce. That same love for the hoop game has now led to Kristensen-Irvine's induction into the Wilfrid Laurier University Sports Hall of Fame.

The fledgling WLU Hall of Fame has only been in existence for the last couple of years and Kristensen-Irvine joins a select group of Golden Hawk graduates named as early entrants into the athletic shrine.

"It's quite an honor and I'm really quite shocked," said Kristensenfrvine during an interview with The Herald last week.

Kristensen-irvine was a star guard on the WLU women's basketball team from 1967-71 and helped lead the Golden Hawks to three consecutive consolation championship titles in the old Ontario-Quebec Athletic Association. The team once narrowly missed earning the OQAA championship crown. "We blew a one-point game," recalled Kristensen-Irvine,

During her tenure at WLU Kristensen-Irvine was also heavily involved in the administrative side of school athletics, serving as president of the women's athletic association and receiving an award for most valuable contribution to athletics.

Upon graduating from WLU Kristensen-Irvine entered the teaching profession where her coaching career has been equally as impressive as her collegiate playing record. Before settling in the Peel board six years ago the ex-Golden Hawk coached at the high school level in Timmins where she sent nine consecutive teams to the all-Ontario finals, six of them winning provincial honors.

Several of her charges from those top notch northern Ontario teams have since made their own marks. "Two of my former athletes are on the Canadian national team," said Kristensen-Irvine. Some of those saine players have also entered the coaching field. "A lot of my kids are coaching, following my footsteps. In fact, a lot of them are crossing my Tuotatepa," she quipped.

While in Timmins, Kristensen-Irvine was also instrumental in the organization of a women's basketball league which is still running successfully today.

Although there was no-national women's basketball program in Canada during Kristensen-Irvine's college hoop career she did receive a degree of international recognition. She worked at the 1976 Montreal Games where women's basketball

bomb." She felt the atmosphere contributed negatively to Canada's subsequent exit from the recent world tournament.

"Canada had an outstanding crew and did have a chance," says Kristensen-Irvine, "But they needed harmony."

However, she remains optimistic about Canada's program in the future. "You always have to look and hope, you must be optimistic," she said. "I think we're on the right track."

She says the biggest obstacle that women's basketball must clear in Ontario is marketing. "We market the game well within the basketball group," she explained. "But the fever isn't there."

Kristensen-Irvine acknowledged the impact a Canadian National Basketball Association franchise would have on the growth of the amateur game in Canada. "The support is there," she says of recent attempts by Toronto-based groups to entice the NBA to southern Ontario markets. "The people of Canada are understanding the game. I think an NBA team would be fabulous. It would help get people into the fever of the game."

Kristensen-Irvine is currently teaching in Mississauga at Valley Senior Public School. She keeps her playing hand finely tuned by competing regularly in the Georgetown Ladies' Basketball League. In the process of completing her Masters Degree in Sociology of Education, she hopes to pursue future ac-creditation in the field of outdoor education. "That's down the road." she states.

Formerly head coach of the Sheridan College Lady Bruins basketball team, Kristensen-Irvine holds a Level III national coaching certificate. She has instructed fledgling coaches provincially and at the advanced coaching camp at York University last summer. She also lends her expertise at the .E.:n-dale summer basketball camp.

According to Kristensen-Irvine there are several outstanding youth basketball programs currently being offered in the province. She is also greatly impressed with the callbre of female hoopsters coming out of Georgetown. "It really surprises me, the kids coming out of Georgetown," she sald. "There are some very fine athletes."

Kristensen-Irvine will continue to be involved in basketball at all levels, she said. She explains her fondness for coaching in this manner: "If you can get someone to love the game, that's great."

Meanwhile, Kristensen-Irvine's own love for the game will never wan. "It'll never be out of my blood," she says.
