# United making a good showing so far

The premier tournament in the province must surely be the Ontario Cup. The youth section of the Georgetown club have tended to ignore the cup for the past few seasons, reckoning that it is putting good dollars to bad use in sponsoring team entries. In view of the records and standards the reasoning is fairly valid.

However our new senior club, Georgetown United, or Peel, as supporters and some players refer to the team, are making a good showing so far. The team is a very young squad, apart from the goalkeeper, Ray Ellis, a founder member and taking time to settle. At this level players have to be good and locally we no longer have sufficient to provide a suitable team. As a result the majority of the players come from out of town.

On Friday last the team came good by handing out a 2-1 defeat to league leading Armourdale for their first league win. Steve Callaghan took full advantage of a slack back pass and harassing by Chris Reilly to open the scoring. With 10 minutes left for play Scott Dymond, a hard working midfielder, broke through to slot home the second goal. The visitors hit back with a goal of some "cutesy" defensive work to make the score respectable. The introduction of right winger Donato Spinelli was a telling factor in the second half.

Spinelli's work continued on Sunday in the Ontario Cup second round win over Insula San Grasso by 5-2. enigma, who sometimes does not show, although having ability to play at this level.

In the next round the United are away to Burlington Nats or Hamilton Pipers.

The indoor facility at Dixie/401 hosted the visit of former Scotland and Arsenal goalkeeper, Bob Wilson, and his goalkeeper coaching school this weekend. Three local goalies attended with their coaches, Jennifer Appar and Alan Jonassen and Bill Harrison's under 18 goalie were our representatives at the school, the first of its kind.

Goalkeeping is a specialized trade in the game and worthy of special treatment. Generally speaking, goalies are born, not made. Coaching of this nature can only benefit the players.

Are you aware that we have a local qualified and registered referee who has informed players that: he will caution any player who kicks the ball above knee height, who misses the ball at a drop ball, etc? This appalling lack of knowledge of the rules of the game and how to apply them brings the game and its good officials into disrepute. It also demonstrates that we have a grave shortage of officials who are knowledgeable and competent.

Inter County leaders Mariners came a cropper in the game with Meteor who pulled off a deserved 3-0 victory last week. Meteor did not allow the Ancient to settle and after an early burst took control of the game for the most part. Plus Welding were held to a 1-1 tie by Villa, whose "Wimbledon" like tactics almost paid off. Trexon recorded their first win beating Ajax by 4-2. Eagles won over a shorthanded Milton by 5-0. Rockwood lost at home to Win Arms 0-2 and leaders Crown and Anchor whacked Laurentians by 4-1.

This Wednesday Plus Welding host Meteor at Alcott with a late kick off, preceded by Mariner vs Crown. Villa host Ajax and Viking have visitors Trexon at Cedarvale at 8:45. United host Eagles, Milton vs Rockwood and Win Arms vs Laurentians are the other fixtures.

Holland showed some character to come to the finals of the European Championship and win over Russia, the first winners in 1968, by two magnificent goals. This current squad have now laid to rest the second place tag left by the total specer squads led by the great Johan Cruyff in '74 and '78.
