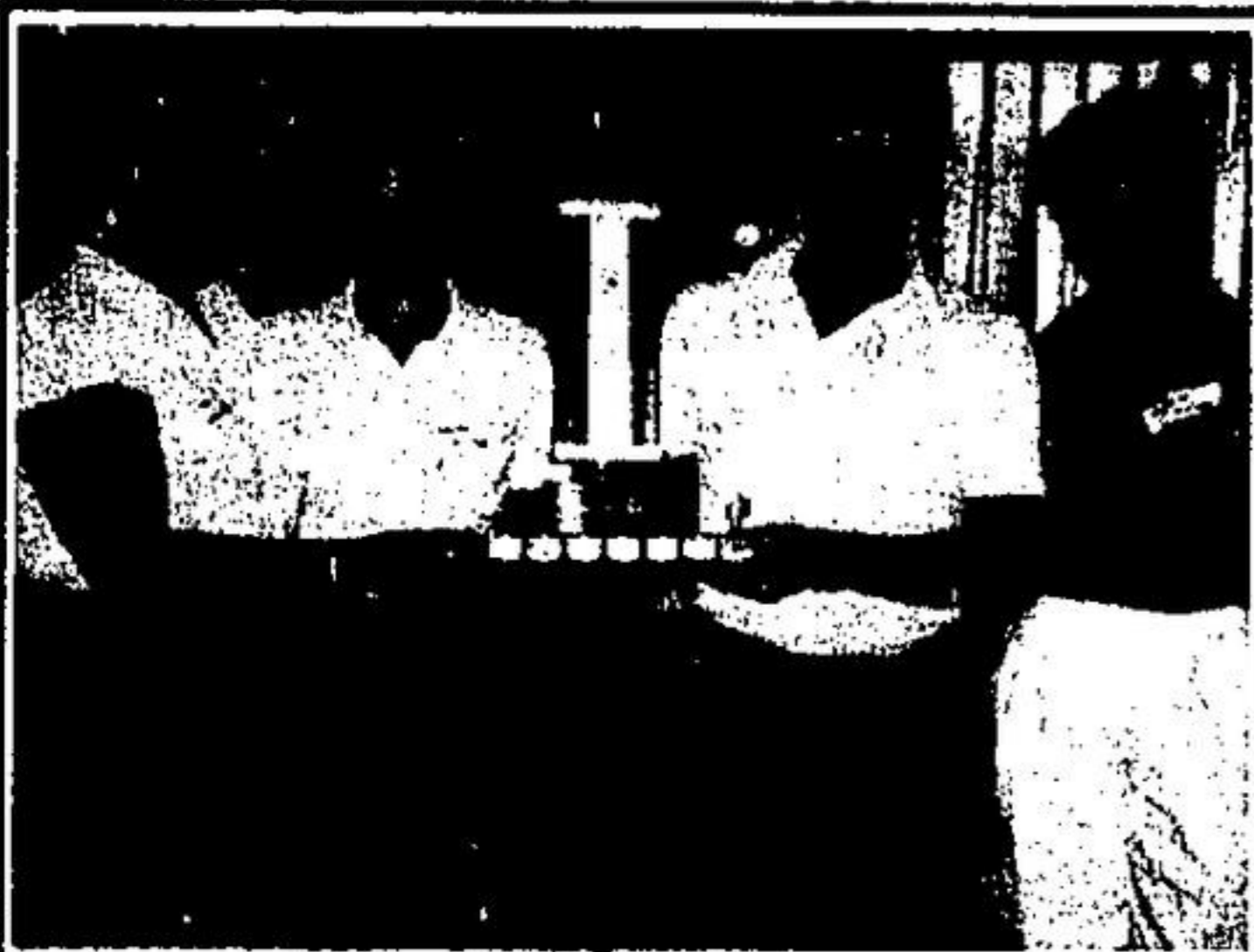

I did not think I would be penning a little news so soon after the close of the Georgetown Industrial League business for 1987/88. For some years now darts players have spoken about the distinct possibility of putting another league together, a competitive league where players would play based upon their form and ability. The Industrial League, which has carried the dart banner for many years, has a player playing equally rule in relation to number of games a player can actually play and is strictly a team game.

The Region of Peel Dart League is about to initiate the heralding of the Halton Division with teams from Georgetown, Milton and Acton for starters. The league is affiliated to the national darts federation and players have automatic membership. Teams have to be formed early and carry a bar or club type of sponsorship. Teams consist of a minimum of eight players and a maximum of 12 players. All players have the entitlement to play in the Zone, Region and Provincial Championships, leading to National and World play.

Already as I type away, O'Tooles, Time Out, Brackens and the Legion are among those who have been approached and are showing some interest. Not all potential players are aware of this addition in the area, until now. Mike Pepper is the lad of initial organizing and has all the details. People who are interested in forming a team should find a sponsoring establishment and advise Mike Pepper (877-8848).

Matches consist of eight singles, four doubles and two team games of

four players each playing 401, 601 and 801 respectively in a best of three format in each category. It is possible for each player to play nine games each evening.

Match nights are Mondays, although the league normally plays on Tuesdays and only on two boards. Points are awarded for team and individual play with MVP, 100, high score and high finish trophies. The entry fee also includes the annual banquet at the Skyline Hotel at the Airport.

Team registration takes place on July 8, a minimum of eight players by Aug. 3 and league play commences around the second week in September.

This is an exciting addition to Halton darts. Who knows, with this county's production of top sporting personalities, the potential of producing yet another champion.

Darts is one of the fastest growing sports/recreations in the country although having been around for many years in a less publicized manner than today. Our local ladies, mixed and industrial leagues have been supported by the Legion for more than forty years or so, judging by the long service awards, and basically on its own. Now all kinds of places are sprouting boards and are a welcome addition.

Dart-throwing and drinking are joined in hand, so to speak, traditionally coming together in bars, clubs and pubs and create tremendous business. Today's stand on drinking and driving will no doubt make teams use the designated driver, and this is highly recommended. Matches will take place on a home and home basis throughout the darting season from September until April and May.

I reckon Mike Pepper's telephone is going to be busy for a while. It is not long until July 8, lads, so get on your bike, as they say. I believe that there is no restriction on the sex of the player either, nor should there be, ability and desire to play is all that is required.
