Laredo: third prize was a 16 foot Lund 'Pike' Fishing Boat, 40 h.p. Evinrude Motor and E-Z Loader Trailer. Other top prizes included a Yamaha Big Bear A.T.V., a week for two at Windy River camp in the Northwest Territories, a fur coat by Cahill Furs of Peterborough, a 3-day hunting trip for two to Dave's Moose and Goose Hunt in Moose Factory, and a Coleman Ram-X Gold Medalist Canoe.

The draw was held on May 31 at the STEL-Red Oak Inn in Peterborough. Winning tickets were drawn by Mr. Mark Mandic, Advertising Director for Angler and Hunter magazine.

The Conservation Lottery is the main fundraiser for the 60-year old Federation, Ontario's largest provincial conservation organization.
