#### Exchange announced

Ontario and China's Jiangsu province will trade coaches in the first phase of a new sports exchange announced recently by Ontario Minister of Tourism and Recreation Hugh P. O'Neil.

Jiangsu will send a total of three truck and field and swimming coaches to Ontario highperformance sports centres for six months. During the same period, a volleyball coach and a badminton coach from Ontario will visit Jiangsu.

The second phase of the exchange will see Ontario send four sports scientists to Jiangsu to deliver lectures and conduct seminars, while Jiangsu will send a sports researcher to study in Ontario.

To complete the program, sports administrators will visit each others' province to study sports systems.

The Minister expressed enthusiasm for the agreement, signed recently by Jiangau Director of Physical Culture and Sports Zhon Weigao and Ontario Deputy Minister of Tourism and Recreation Jim Кеспал.

"By sharing resources and expertise, sports programs in both provinces become stronger," Mr. O'Neil said "We found in our earlier exchange with Jianggu that our different strengths complimented one another."

## Triathlon series is expanding

The most famous trinthlon race is the fronman, held annually in Hawaii. This long course event is

made up a 24-mile swim, 112-mile bicycle course, and, a 26-mile marathon run. First held in 1978 with 15 entrants, the Ironman started a sports trend that has swept across Europe and North America to include hundreds of thousands of participants every year




