Teddy Bear Tournament

Hoosiers strike silver at Falls

The Halton Hills Hoosiers Pee-wee Girls softball team went prospecting for gold, but struck silver instead, at the Niagara Falls Teddy Bear Tournament. The competition was held on July 22-24, with two four-team divisions each playing a round-robin, with the winners meeting in the gold medal game, and the second place teams meeting for the bronze medal.

The Hoosiers were in against Niagara Falls, Valley East, and Windsor in the preliminaries. They won all three games to clinch a championship berth against the team from St. Catharines. However, the team ran out of gas in the final innings, and had to settle for silver medals.

The locals opened against the host Niagara Falls team on Friday evening. Twice they came back from four-run deficits, before finally emerging with a 12-9 victory.

After leaving the bases loaded in the top of the first, the Hoosiers allowed the Falls to open up a quick 4-0 lead in the bottom half, with a couple of two-out Hoosier errors doing most of the damage. The locals got one back in the second, when Andrea Leeking worked a walk, and eventually stole home.

They took a 5-1 lead in the top of the third, parlaying walks to Amanda Tutt, Tracy Hagan and Lesley Einman, and singles by Stacy Colarossi, Shannon Morris, and Leeking, into four runs.

Niagara Falls regained the lead in their half, making good advantage of three walks and a Hoosier error, to score five runs and take a 9-5 lead. But the host team returned the favor in the top of the fourth, walking Kim Sheppard, Tutt, and Colarossi, to set up a two-out, bases loaded situation. Morris delivered a run-scoring single, to make it 9-6, and Kelly Ambrose cleared the bases with a grand slam shot down the third base line. Tammy Richards followed with a well-hit single that was mis-played into a home run, and Hagan followed that with a double and a steal of home, to make it 12-9 for the Hoosiers.

The locals set the Falls down 1-2-3 in the bottom of the inning, to cement the victory, as the 75-minute time limit ran out.

The second game was scheduled for 5 p.m. Saturday, against Windsor. But rain forced cancellation, and rescheduling of the remaining games on Sunday. This meant that the team had to play three games in the one day, which contributed to their late-inning collapse in the championship game.

The Hoosiers took the field against Windsor at 9 a.m. They struck quickly in the first inning. Morris hit a triple to the gap in left-centre, and was driven home by an Ambrose ground-out. Richard then hit another triple, and came home on an overthrow. Hagan walked and was driven home by an Einman single. It was 3-0.

After holding Windsor in their half, the locals built the lead to 11-0 in the second. Sheppard and Ambrose were hit batswomen; Amy

Korzack, Tutt, Colarossi, Morris, and Hagan were issued walks; Sherie Peacock singled and Richard tripled.

The score remained the same until the bottom of the fourth inning, when the wheels came off for the Hoosiers. With time running out, Windsor strung together three walks and nine hits, to score 10 runs and put runners at second and third, with two out. The locals got out of it, however, by striking out the final batter just as the time limit expired. Final score 11-10.

At 3 p.m. Halton Hills went up against Valley East. For the first time the Hoosiers won the toss and were the home team.

The Hoosiers broke on top 3-0 in the first inning, on consecutive base hits by Morris, Ambrose, Richard, and Hagan. But they let their opponents back into the game by issuing seven walks in the top of the second. It was 5-3 for Valley East.

From then on, however, it was all the home team. Morris, in relief, struck out eight of the next 10 batters to hold Valley East scoreless the rest of the way. Meanwhile, the locals scored five runs in both the third and fifth innings, to salt away the victory. In the third, Hagan, Ambrose and Morris drove in runs. And in the fifth, singles by Ambrose, Richard and Deanna Louth, and a triple by Einman did the bulk of the damage. Final score: 13-5.

The championship game pitted Halton Hills against a team that seemed very solid, both offensively and defensively. After three innings, the Hoosiers had played St. Catharines to a 0-0 standoff, in a pitcher's duel between Morris and a pair of St. Catharines' hurlers. The locals actually had the best scoring chance, when, with two on, Hagan hit a home run ball just foul, down the third base line.

In the fourth, the opposition scored an unearned run, to take a 1-0 lead.

They increased the lead to 4-0 in the fifth, when a fly ball skipped past the right fielder, to score three runs.

For all practical purposes, that was the game right there. St. Catharines scored 13 more times in the last two innings. The lone Hoosier run came in the sixth. Sheppard singled and was driven home by a solid single to centre by Tutt. Final score: 17-1.

As a whole, the weekend tournament was a success. The pitching staff of Morris, Einman and Richard played well, with Morris recording three victories and one defeat, and the staff recording a collective strike-out/walk ratio of 27/19. Offensively, there were several leaders. In RBIs, Ambrose had eight, Richard six, and Morris three. In runs scored, Morris had seven, Richard five, and Ambrose, Colarossi, and Hagan four each. The walk leaders were Einman, with four, and Tutt and Hagan with three each. And the hit leaders were Richard with seven, Morris with six and Ambrose with five. Defensively, outstanding plays were made by Leeking, Richard and Ambrose.
