A new provincial law which forced a Milton councillor to be reappointed to council because he moved out of town will not affect Halton Hills Councillor John McDonald.

Bill 106, an amendment to the Municipal Elections Act, states councillors must either live in the municipality they represent or own interest in property or a business

Mr. McDonald, who represents Ward 3 at Halton Region and on town council, moved to Milton last September. He works at Rothmans -Benson and Hedges in Toronto.

But he won't have to take the same route as a counterpart in Milton. Coun. Wray Lamont moved from

Campbellville to Flamborough since the last election and under the new law, which took effect June 8, he is no longer qualified to represent his consitutents as a councillor. He rented a vacant building in

Campbellville in early July. That allowed him to be sworn in again to represent his ward. Halton Hills Administrator-Clerk Dan Costea said the two

municipalities simply have different interpretations of the law. Milton said the law takes effect immediately and had their coun-

cillor take appropriate steps to com-However, Halton Hills sought legal advice, said Mr. Costea.

"Our legal advice and discussions with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs have indicated that isn't absolutely necessary," he said of reappointing of the councillor. He said the law is not retroactive.


