The Ontario Environment Ministry has charged a Milton brake lining manufacturer with offences relating to the emission of unpleasant odors.

Distex Industries Inc., of 521 McGeachie Dr., Milton, faces fi ve charges under section 13(1) (c) of the Environmental Protection Act (EPA), which relates to being likely to cause material discomfort; one charge under section 13 (1) (h) of the EPA, which relates to being likedly to interfere with the normal conduct of business; and one charge under 8 (1) (b) of the EPA, which relates to failing to obtain a Certificate of Approval for altering a manufacturing

The maximum fine for these charges under the EPA is \$50,000 per count.

A return court date has been set for 9 a.m., Aug. 18, at Milton Provincial Offences Court No. 2
