The driver of the Chevrolet, Earl Horne, 64, of Mississauga and passenger Rosemary Simma, 59 of Etobicoke, were pronounced dead at the accident scene by coroner Dr.

Donald Aikenhead. "The car bounced off the truck," said Halton Regional Police Sergeant Garry Bogue, "for some unknown reason Mr. Horne pulled out and was broadsided."

Halton police were still investigating the accident Wednesday afternoon.


