## Labatt's backs charity golf

Labatt Brewerles of Canada announced the signing of a three year agreement with the Royal Canadian Golf Association (RCGA) to assume sponsorship of the largest charity golf competition in Canada, involving tournaments at the club, provincial and national levels.

Formerly known as the Crown Life Pro-Am, now to be called the Labett's National Team Pro-Am, this club team championship ultimately brings together 10 provincial teams in a national final, scheduled this year for September 8-9 at St. Charles Country Club in

Each provincial team is composed of four players from the same club: a low (0-12), medium (13-18) and high (19-30) handicap amateur golfer and the club professional.

Sanctioned by the RCGA and Provincial Golf Associations, this competition last year attracted 20,000 golfers representing more than 370 golf clubs across Canada.

Each golfer pays an entry fee of \$10 which goes directly to both a designated provincial charity and provincial golf association programs supporting amateur and funior golf.

The competition is open to club members, 19 years of age and over, who are also members of their provincial golf association.

There are four stages of play. Each participating golf club, and more than 400 clubs are expected to take part this year, will designate a

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2-3 week period in which members can play one or more qualifying

The low 16 qualifiers in each handicap group (0-12, 13-15 and 19-30) then enter match play (four rounds) or a 36-hole stroke playdown to determine the club's team members. The three winners (one from each handicap group) then join their club professional for the Labatt's provincial championship where they meet teams from other clubs in an 18-hole competition. The winning team advances to the Labatt's National Team Pro-Am.

The tournament format was inaugurated by Crown Life Insurance Company in 1973 in Manitoba and has grown since to become the largest event of its kind in North America.

In 1975, the tournament expanded to include Saskatchewan and Alberta. British Columbia joined in 1978, Ontario in 1980, Quebec in 1982 and the Atlantic provinces in 1983.

Since 1973, more than \$800,000 has been raised for provincial charitable organizations and provincial golf association programs supporting amateur and junior golf.

Due to changes in its corporate marketing directions and strategies, Crown Life has decided to withdraw as the major sponsor of this competition but will remain as an associate sponsor this year, funding the pro-

vincial and national banquets as well as providing technical and administrative support to the organizers.

Other associate sponsors are Canadian Airlines International, which is providing airfare to the national final for the participating teams, and SCORE Magazine, which is helping to promote the tournaments nationally.
