Rug hooking involves small strips of colored wool, patience and a good dose of imagination. You can use grandmother's checkered wool skirt, uncle Fred's woolen pants or fabric purchased from a fabric.

"There are thousands of hours in these pictorials," said rug hooker Marge Willis, Terra Cotta resident and a member of the Georgetown Rug Hookers' Guild.

"It's a craft that goes back 6,000 years, and we still do it the same way today," she said.

Rug hooker Jan Colbran described the method used by the Guild as "traditional."
