Another fine mess to sort out

Whose mess is this anyway?

In last week's Queen's Park Report I said that since we all help produce the garbage that goes to make up the contents of a 'sanitary landfill', we all have a right and duty to help determine how the garbage disposal problem is solved. I am not suggesting that we each maintain and monitor our own backyard gar-bage dump but that society must maintain ultimate control of this type of activity because of its poten-tial to harm all of us. Stated bluntly, the question is: "Does private enter-prise have any place in the garbage disposal business?"

At the risk of being accused of sounding like a politician I am going to suggest that the answer is both yes and no. Government should not be doing those things that private enterprise can do more efficiently. The problem in this case is that efficiency has more to do with safety than profit. It hardly seems reasonable to ask a business to continually foregonity profit in the public tinually forego its profit in the public interest. It is equally unreasonable to ask society to believe that an intelligent businessman is going to do

Garbage dumps have become such large scale operations that they are taking resources away from other important municipal undertakings. How can we ensure both immediate and long term safety as well as allow municipalities to get on with the other elements of the business of governing?

A partnership between business and government would seem to provide some of the answers. This partnership could take several forms. At its simplest it might consist of a municipal government contracting out the management of a site to a private company while retaining the right to monitor site safety as well as determine tipping fees. Various levels of government might enter into agreements to use private sites provided they retain the ultimate right to monitor both the site and its safety and the type of waste that is being dumped. Co-operative ventures might be arranged where the participating government was responsible for landfilling but invited private concerns onto the site to set up and operate recycling and energy from waste facilities.

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
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
