Murphy, Jonassen lead Under-18's

Last Monday at Cedarvale the Georgetown Under-18 Soccer Reps came out on top in a big game with Streetsville taking a close 2-1 victory.

Streetsville along with Georgetown and Milton are vying for top spot in the Peel Halton League.

The visitors were a man short, but that was hardly noticeable as they put quite a show of soccer on, repeatedly frustrating the hometown forwards with a clever offside trap.

Georgetown was the first to get on the scoresheet when Martin Barnard's shot was palmed off the goal line by a Streetsville defender. Billy Murphy stepped up to convert the penalty kick. Play then continued on a fairly even basis with the Georgetown trio of Mark Covert, Murphy and Glynn Poole having to play at peak performance in order to contain their Streetsville counterparts in midfield.

Forty minutes into the half the visitors equalized on a quickly taken free kick in front of the Georgetown goal. Alan Jonassen, still trying to organize his defence was caught napping as the ball was lobbed over the defensive wall into the top corner of the net.

The second half was delayed due to an injury suffered by Jonassen making a save at the foot of the post. There was some doubt as to whether he would continue the game before he was allowed to carry on. It was just as well he did as he was called upon to make a superb save mid way through the half. The battle for midfield control continued as the visitors remained successful with their offside trap until Poole found a way to beat it on the 60-minute mark. Picking up a pass from Trent

Cull in midfield he feigned a pass to his forwards then carried the ball himself through the middle, and with one defender tugging at his shirt, another one pulling his arm, he let go a beautiful 20-yard drive that beat the advancing goalkeeper.

Streetsville lost a player to injury leaving them two men short and the game appeared to sway in Georgetown's favor, but Jonassen still had to make a couple of outstanding saves to foil the attackers even though the four man defence in front of him was having one of its best games of the season. Tim Racinsky, back on form, along with Dave Varicchio and Derek Oram stood firm whilst Trent Cull played his best game yet as he broke up the Streetsville attack time after time. In the late stages of the game both Barnard and Duane Coleman were unlucky as both had narrow misses after making great runs to get behind the Streetsville defence.

With only minutes left in the game the Streetsville goalie pulled off a magnificent save to foil Murphy. Murphy hit a sensational overhead kick from Weatherall's corner which had goal written all over it. It needed a big team effort to win this one and the Pizza Boys delivered.

It is now 12 games undefeated for the U18s who now go on a two game road trip, followed by the League Cup Semi Final and hopefully Final before coming back to Cedarvale for the last game of the season against Milton on Sept. 12.
