Birds vs. Howells in final

The following new general minimum wage rates (excluding harvest workers) take effect at the beginning of the work week in which October 1st, 1988 occurs:

Hunting/fishing guides (half-day)	\$23.75
Hunting/fishing guides (day)	\$47.50

The following new minimum wage rates for fruit, vegetable and tobacco harvesters will go into effect on January 1st, 1989:

Adults	\$ 4.75
Students under 18	\$ 3.90
