Bill Harrison of the Under-14 squad is not doing so well, the team being second bottom of their division after 10 games.

The Inter County leagues are completed with Meteor again taking first place in the first division and must be favorites to win the cup. Only Villa and Mariners managed to take any points from Meteor and they were both ties. Therefore Meteor went through the league table without any losses, a fine achievement. Mariners came second some seven points behind. Ajax finished in last place upon their return to the top division.

Second division champions are Crown and Anchor by four points from Eagles. This season Crown stuck to the player rules and earned their position with fine soccer. Milton FC are again the foot of the table with zero points, having failed to register their players in time.

Playoff sections are Meteor, Villa and Trexcon in one section of the first. Mariners, Viking, Plus Welding and Ajax are in the other section. Second division sections are Crown, United and Winchester with Eagles, Laurentians, Rockwood and Milton in section two.

Last week a discipline hearing suspended Plus Welding player Des Dillon until the end of April 1990 following a series of physical actions on an Ajax player in a July match at Alcott which ended abruptly. Plus Welding then refused to play Mariners as a form of protest, another matter for the league executive to deal with.

Results to date in playoffs are as follows: Meteor 2; Villa 0; Ancients 1; Viking 2; Plus Welding 0; Ajax 4; Meteor 2; Trexcon 0; Ancient 1; Plus Welding 0; Viking 1; Ajax 0. Trexcon and Villa have both received byes and two points each for these games. Meteor and Viking lead their sections respectively at this juncture.

United 3; Winchester 0; Milton 0; Eagles 1; Laurentians 3; Rockwood 0; Crown 0; Laurentians 4; United 2; Rockwood 0; Winchester 1; Milton 0. Crown and Eagles both have received byes and receive two points for these games. Section leaders are United and Laurentians, with

Eagles tied on points with Laurentians as a result of their bye game.

This Wednesday Mariners play Ajax at Alcott at 6:30 p.m. in a crucial game for the section. Varian are due to follow against Plus Welding. Villa are home to Trexcon in the only other game locally.

The major shock in European circles was the failure of England to show up in the European Championship for which they were made favorites. Over \$80 million changed hands in the round of player transfers before the beginning of the English season. Strangely, the 1994 World Cup, in going to the USA, did not appear to be a shock or even a mystery. It was well known before the FIFA meeting to decide, that the USA had won the vote. Only the size of the vote was in doubt. Brazil had two votes, Morocco seven votes and the USA had the rest, a clear majority.

The Los Angeles Olympics dollars and spectators swayed the day. Brazil have no money and Morocco no stadiums - USA have both. Canada's task in qualifying is made easier by the suspension of Mexico from international competition in playing much overage players in youth competitions recently.
