Terry Fox Run set for Sunday

Citizens of Halton Hills can honor the memory of a great Canadian and combine healthy exercise with some much-needed fundralsing at the eighth annual Terry Fox Run on

Sunday. Both Georgetown and Acton will be hosting Terry Fox Run events on Sunday and organizers are hoping for large turnouts. Acton High School will be the site of the Acton run while Georgetown District High School has been designated as Georgetown's Terry Fox Run loca-

Participants can cover the traditional 10 km distance by running, jogging, walking, riding or wheeling around the respective high school tracks.

Both runs will begin at 8 a.m. with Georgetown wrapping up its event at around 12 noon and Acton going until 3 p.m. Participants can show up at any time during the events to complete their 10 km of exercise.

An official ribbon-cutting start will be held at Acton's run beginning at 8 a.m. and co-organizer Nan Hurst says that's when most of the annual run's "regulars" turn up. "Our regulars are always there for the start," said Hurst. "They really go out and get the sponsors too. You don't need a big group as long as they're dedicated.'

Last year's Acton run attracted about 100 participants and donations

and pledges reached over \$14,000 in total. Hurst, 71, herself collected \$600 as a participant in 1987.

Refreshments will be available at AHS during the run and participants will be included in special draws for donated prizes throughout the event. Hurst urges anyone not physically taking part in the run to add their name to a pledge sheet. "If you can't participate, sponsor," said Hurst.

Georgetown's event raised about \$3,000 last year and co-organizer Susan Decley is anticipating a much larger figure this year both in terms of dollars raised and people taking part. "Hopefully we'll do as well or better than Acton did last year." said Decley.

Deeley is hoping local schools will get involved and she said children can form relay teams to complete the run if they aren't able to cover the entire 10 km distance individual-

Pledge sheets are available at various locations throughout Georgetown and Acton and participants are asked to either submit a sponsor sheet or make a donation at the time of their run.

Funds raised from the numerous nation-wide Terry Fox Run events on Sunday are directed to the Canadian Cancer Society for ongoing research.

Fox died in 1980 after completing almost half of his proposed cross-Canada run for cancer research.

Outshoot Milton 61-47

Goal-hungry Raiders lose

It's not often a hockey team fires 61 shots at the opposition goaltender and loses the game.

But that's just what happened to the Georgetown Haiders last Saturday night as they were dumped 8-4 by the visiting Milton Merchants despite outshooting their counterparts 61-47. The loss left the Raiders with an 0-2 record in Central Jr. "B" Hockey League exhibition action.

Despite the loss Raider coach Peter Sturgeon was pleased with the effort of another predominantly rookle lineup for Georgetown. ()n Saturday the sophomore bench boss dressed 19 players, only four of them veterans. In the team's first preseason contest two weeks ago against Richmond Hill, Sturgeon iced a roster featuring 18 rookies.

"Any time you can get 60 shots has got to be good," said Sturgeon "It seemed the goaltending was in Milton's favor. We missed three breakaways early on and after that scored early."

Four of Milton's eight goals were scored with a Raider in the penalty box and the Merchants added insult to injury by notching one shorthanded goal as well. The Raiders tallied three powerplay goals of their own.



Milton actually took more minor penalty minutes than Georgetown with the Merchants serving 34 minutes to the Ralders' 33. Georgetown received a pair of fighting majors and Milton was tagged with one.

Veteran Georgetown forward Kevin Dance showed he's ready to excite local hockey fans all over again as he fired a hattrick for the Ralders. Jim English, a GMHA bantam product, Impressed with a single goat.

Milton led 1-0 after the first period on a goal by Chris Turner at 12:35 with two Raiders in the sin bin, Georgetown peppered Milton's starting netminder Carlo Simone with 21 first frame shots but the backstop managed to keep the puck out of the net. Simone's display included a big stop on a breakaway by Chris Lee with Georgetown two men short.

The visitors built up an impressive 40 lead in the second period with two more powerplay markers and a shorthanded effort. Milton's victim was Georgetown goalle Paul St. Pierre who replaced starter Charlie Potvin midway through the period.

Georgetown finally got on the board with less than a minute remaining in the second period as Kevin Dance notched his first goal of the night. The diminutive centre jammed a loose puck past Milton goalie Corey Vincent during a goalmouth scramble at 19:29 with Georgetown on the powerplay. Shannon Storr picked up an assist on the

goal. But Milton picked up the pace again in the first minute of period three as the Merchants took advantage of some lax defensive play by Georgetown to go up 5-1 with Inn Ellis taking a pass from behind the Raider net and whipping a wristshot past St. Pierre.

Dance followed with his second goal of the game at 5:09 as he flipped a pass from John Latour over the outstretched glove of Milton netminder Alex Piazza with both teams skating at full strength.

Dance's tally seemed to provide again just 11 seconds later as Sean Healey took a pass from behind Georgetown's net and beat St. Pierre from the slot.

Georgetown's 24-shot third period barrage didn't pay dividends again until 16:31 when Jlm English tucked a rebound into the Milton net with the Raiders enjoying the man advantage.

Milton replied less than two minutes later as Derek Zebedee pounced on an errant Georgetown pass in front of the Raider net to beat a handcuffed St. Plerre.

Dance completed his hattrick and the scoring for the night as he deposited a rebound past Plazza with 34 seconds left on the clock and with Georgetown working on the powerplay.

RAIDER RAMBLINGS: Sturgeon cut three more players after Saturday's game to reduce the Raiders lineup to about 22 players.
