

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Local umpire has hand in Seoul event

Richard Willis of Terra Cotta won't be attending the 1988 Summer Olympic Games in Seoul, South Korea later this month but his presence will be felt there nevertheless.

Willis, a member of Baseball Canada's umpires technical committee and the chief official for Ontario, was part of a four-man panel that selected Canada's umpiring representative to the Seoul Games' baseball competition.

Jim Cressman, a sportswriter with the London Free Press, will be behind the plate for Canada when the baseball competition takes place in Seoul. Cressman, who has had professional umpiring experience at the "AAA" minor league level, survived a short list of Canada's top national and International umpires to make the Olympic grade.

Willis joined other high-ranking Baseball Canada officials from British Columbia, New Brunswick and Quebec in considering applicants for Canada's umpire position. "It's the icing on the cake for Jim," said Willis of Cressmen's selection to the Olympic umpiring team, "I expect he'll do an outstanding job."

The 1988 Games will mark the first time ever that baseball will be played as an official Olympic medal sport. In 1984 at Los Annales baseball was played as a demonstration event.

Meanwhile, Willis didn't let the duties of committee member take him too far away from the on-field action during the last few weeks. He umpired the Ontario Sr. "A" final recently in Oakville and last weekend was back behind the plate to call the strikes and balls in the provincial Sr. "B" finals in Dun-
