World Police Olympics

Georgetown to "tri" it Downunder

A Georgetown resident will be travelling downunder to uphold the athletic honor of the Halton Regional Police.

Glenn Edwards of Georgetown, a 21-year-old Burlington-based Halton Regional Police constable, will leave for Australia on Oct. 5 where he will represent the regional force in the International Police Olympics. "I've been counting the days for a year," said Edwards of his impending departure. "I'm very excited about this trip."

Edwards, an accomplished amateur endurance athlete, will compete in four events at the worldwide police sports festival. His main event will be the triathlon consisting of a 1-km swim, 30-km bicycle ride and 10-km run. Edwards will also vie for honors in the half-marathon (13-mile run), 50-km bike race and 10-km road race.

All the events in the regularly-held Police Olympics will take place this year in Sydney. "It's a global competition," explained Edwards.

"There'll be police competing from all over the world."

Edwards' trip won't conclude, however, once the Police Games end in early October. The Georgetown resident will embark on a two-week bicycle trip with his father Ken, who will be accompanying Glenn to Australia to spectate at the Police Games.

"We're going to bike to either Melbourne or Brisbane and back to Sydney," said the younger Edwards. The extended cycling journey won't be the first for Edwards. The sophomore Halton police officer already has a bike trip to Nova Scotia under his belt. "I did that three years ago," he said.

While he is a devoted triathlete and competes regularly in Ontario triathlons during the summer, Ed-

wards did not have to qualify to attend the Police Olympics. "It was basically open as long as you could finance your own trip," he said. Edwards will combine three-weeks vacation with an official leave-of-absence to make his trip.

Edwards carries impressive credentials into the Police Olympics including a first-place finish in his age group at the recent Peel Regional-hosted Ontario Police cross-country championships. He regularly places in the top 15 finishers in his age group in the triathlons he enters and this summer boasted a high finish of fifth and a low of 18th.

Edwards most recently competed in the Milton Triathlon on Sept. 4 where he placed in the top five of his category.
