If you belong to a volunteer group that relies upon fundraising and sponsorship to keep operating or to assist others, consider attending Greg Burns' workshop on how to become a better buck booster! Greg Burns is the Director of Recreation for Cambridge, Ontario and is responsible for the administration of parks, arenas, pools, community centres and recreation program services. Willing to share his ideas and experience, Greg has been a featured speaker at workshops for volunteer and professional organizations at the local, provincial, state, national and international level in both Canada and the United States. His sessions are lively, informative and stress a practical approach.

Ten Rules for Successful Fundraising - A step by step strategy that will assist any group, regardless of size, in avoiding pitfalls.

Fundraising Events and Projects - An overview will be conducted of approximately 75 events or projects that your group can use.

Promotional Gimmicks - A listing of some innovative ideas on how to promote your event.

Public/Private Partnerships - How to develop a co-operative partnership with a corporate entity, and how this can be advantageous to you.

Community Allies - Discovering "friends" that exist all around you.

Publications and Resources on Fundraising - A list of the various resources available on fundraising.

The workshop combines the use of overheads, useful handouts, and real life examples of successful events to cover the topic. Tyke Eagles flight yields third place in OBA's

On Sept. 3-4 the Georgetown Tyke Eagles placed third in the Ontario "C" Division playoffs, which were held in Cobourg.

The first game which was played against Merrittown was close but Georgetown came out swinging and held the lead throughout the game taking a 7-5 victory. Martin Johnston pitched an excellent game with Jose Mora coming in at the top of the sixth inning to keep a lid on things.

The second game was played against the host team, Cobourg. In the first inning the Eagles came out swinging hard again Roy (Jobbs) Stuckless, the team's home run leader, hit a two run homer to lead Cobourg 4-0 after one Cobourg came back strong and took the lead and the game 15-5.

The Eagles' third and last game of the day came against Tillsonburg. Tillsonburg, a strong team and a record of 26 wins and no losses throughout the season, were in the same boat as Georgetown. A loss here, means elimination from the playoffs.

Tillsonburg took the lead in the first inning 2-0, but the Eagles came back to tie it 2-2 after one inning of play. Tillsonburg went ahead again in the second inning to make it 4-2, but the Eagles battled back to tie it 4-4. In the third inning Martin Johnston was replaced by Jose Mora in the pitching department. Jose (The Terminator) relieved three batters with his first ten pitches, all three being strike outs. He then retired the first three batters in the fourth inning to keep the score tied at 4-4. At the bottom of the fifth and the bases loaded, Tillsonburg's pitcher walks a run in, making the score 5-4 for Georgetown. In the sixth inning Michael Downes playing centre field, made a spectacular catch, when the ball just missed the shortstop's glove and landed in his glove, just inches above the turf for the third out.

In the seventh and last inning, Tillsonburg had the tying run on third and the go ahead run on second. With two outs, the runner on third advanced too far and was caught in the midst of a run down. The catcher, Roy Stuckless, put the tag on the runner for the final out of the game. Georgetown wins 5-4 and continues in the playoffs.

The Eagles had to face Cobourg once again the following day because of the identical win-loss records the two teams had. With great fan support throughout each game, the Eagles could not produce a win against Cobourg. Thus being eliminated from going on to the finals against Amherstburg.

The manager, Mike Murdock, and the two coaches Mike Daquano and Gerry Adam would like to thank the players and the parents who contributed and participated throughout a successful season.
