

## Police beat

### Charges pending

Charges are pending following a two-car collision on Steeles Avenue at the 10th Line at 12:50 p.m. Oct. 3. Police say a 1985 Mack truck, driven by a 33-year-old Brampton man, was westbound on Steeles Avenue when it was struck at the rear wheels by an eastbound 1986 Pontiac driven by a 61-year-old Brampton man. The Pontiac crossed the centre line and struck the truck, police say. The Pontiac then continued into a ditch on the north side of the road and came to a rest on a driveway.

The driver of the Pontiac, Maria Costa, suffered major injuries and was taken to Credit Valley Hospital. Her passenger, Jose Dos Santos Costa, suffered minor injuries and was also taken to Credit Valley Hospital.

### Vehicles collide

Charges of making an improper left turn were laid following an accident on Guelph Street at Alcott Avenue at 5:40 p.m. Oct. 4.

Police say a 1980 Dodge, driven by a 21-year-old Acton man, was travelling westbound on Guelph Street when it went through an orange light at Alcott Avenue.

The collision occurred when a 1980 Chevrolet, driven by a 39-year-old Georgetown man, attempted to make a left hand turn onto Alcott Avenue. Damage to both vehicles was moderate.

### Moderate damage

Two cars were damaged following an accident at the intersection of Guelph Street and Maple Avenue at 3:25 p.m. Oct. 4.

A 1984 Lincoln, driven by a 46-year-old Georgetown woman, was travelling eastbound on Guelph Street when it struck a westbound 1985 Hyundai which was turning left onto Maple Avenue from Guelph Street, police say.

Damage to the Lincoln was light and the Hyundai received moderate damages. Charges of making an improper left turn have been laid.

### Court date set

A 21-year-old Acton man was charged with impaired driving at 1:50 a.m. Oct. 9. Halton Regional Police observed a car travelling at a high rate of speed on Highway 25 just north of Highway 7 and laid the charge. He will appear in court Nov. 7.

### Man injured

A 54-year-old man was injured in an industrial accident at Neilson's chocolate factory at 279 Guelph Street early Oct. 3.

Police say the man was operating a yogurt machine when he attempted to clear away some cups. His right arm became caught in the machine. He was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital with a suspected broken arm.

### Coats missing

Two people are being sought following an incident at the Olde Hide House in Acton around noon, Oct. 8.

Police say two suspicious people, a male and a female, set off the security alarm when they left the premises.

A security person attempted to catch them but the pair fled in their vehicle. Two mink and leather coats valued at \$2,800 are missing.

### Sexual assault charge

A 33-year-old Acton man has been charged with sexual assault following an incident at Breeze's Camp Ground in Acton Sept. 27.

Police say a 15-year-old boy was involved in the non-violent "groping" assault. The man will appear in court on Oct. 31.

### Purse missing

A woman who got up to dance at the Hollywood Tavern in Norval Oct. 8 returned to her seat to find her purse missing. The theft occurred between 8 p.m. and midnight. Missing is \$8 cash and \$70 worth of other goods including credit cards and a driver's license.

### Cassettes stolen

Four cassette tapes and some pipe tobacco were stolen from a vehicle parked outside the Legion in Georgetown sometime between 9:30 p.m. Oct. 8 and 1 a.m. Oct. 9. Police say the owner returned to find some cassette tapes lying under the car and four country and western tapes missing. Value of the missing goods is about \$40.

### Flags removed

Thieves struck at Fernbrook homes on Mountainview Road and Sideroad 10 sometime between 8 p.m. Oct. 8 and 1 a.m. Oct. 9, according to police.

Police say someone entered the property and turned the power off, then stole 20 flags valued at \$950.

### Car vandalized

Someone entered a car parked at 19 Chapel Street in Georgetown Oct. 2 and stole a black suede jacket, two cassette tapes and an identification folder. The theft occurred between 5 p.m. and 9 p.m., police say.

Value of the stolen goods is \$160.

Also missing is a Chicago Black Hawks hockey sweater. Value of the missing goods is listed at \$1,500.

# McCauley says separate board will be addressing changes

Halton Roman Catholic Board trustee Irene McCauley from Georgetown announced she will run for re-election in Halton Hills in the Nov. 14 municipal election.

Funding and changes within the Catholic Board will highlight Mrs. McCauley's platform.

"We're waiting for the government to work out the implementation of Bill 30," she said, adding that the Board will then receive "full funding."

The Catholic Board has discussed adding a junior kindergarten level to the school system as early as September, 1989, said the trustee.

"Neither the public nor separate boards have junior kindergarten," she said.

Mrs. McCauley described the relationship between the Halton Board of Education and the Catholic Board as "a very good working relationship."

"Our Halton committee and the public board have worked well together," she said.

Halton's two school boards met this past summer to discuss joint needs within the Region. The Halton Roman Catholic Separate School Board has four high schools since receiving government funding with Bill 30. Two schools are located in Burlington, and one is in Oakville. A

Mrs. McCauley wants to see Catholic schools get the best educational tools available, which means improving existing courses and adding new ones. The Catholic Board will review programs and future needs, she said.

"We have never really had (programs like) auto mechanics and the technical courses... we hope to look at this," she said.

Irene McCauley is a Georgetown resident and has served as a Catholic Board trustee since 1980. She hopes to be re-elected to help provide "what the students need to march forward into the 21st century."

### Joe Clark visits
