Robert Wiggins, formerly of Norval, died at his home in Somerset, Pennsylvania, Aug. 12.

Mr. Wiggins was born Jan. 25, 1906 in Norval. He was the son of the late James and Mary (Kelly-Morrow) Wiggins.

He is preceded in death by one sister and two brothers.

Mr. Wiggins is survived by his wife, the former Vida B. Senter, and children: Carole Musser, of Somerset; Robert Wiggins Jr., of Toronto; Robert Wiggins III, of Allison Park; and grandchildren John and Amy Musser.

Mr. Wiggins was a brother of Hugh McNally of Toronto and Jack and Gerald Morrow, both of Georgetown.

He was a member of the United

Methodist Church of Dallas, Texas, a 32nd degree Mason and member of the A.C. Garrett Lodge of Dallas. He attended Columbia University in New York.

He was a driver for the Greyhound bus lines from 1924-27 and New York district manager from 1927 to 1937.

Mr. Wiggins joined the American Locker Co. in 1937 and stayed until 1971 when he retired as vice-president.

He was a major in the Civil Air Patrol and in the US Army Air Corp. during the Second World War.
