Miss wild card berth "by a whisker"

M's shine at Gold Puck

The Georgetown M and M Bantams travelled to Waterloo last weekend to participate in the prestigious annual Gold Puck Hockey Tournament.

Although the M and Ms faced very stiff opposition from triple "A" clubs they were not outclassed, in fact, they came within a whisker of winning their division.

The local pucksters found themselves in a tough division with three "AAA" centres - Ottawa, Guelph and North York - and although they were tied with North York after round robin with two wins and one loss, they lost the division title on goals for and against.

Friday saw the M and Ms reluctantly give an afternoon of school for their first game of the tourney against Guelph and carted off the win with a 3-0 victory.

The local stars stunned their opponents when they scored at the 20-second mark of the first period on a goal by Adam Hills and assisted by Trevor Elinesky. The remainder of the period saw some excellent up-and-down hockey with sparkling saves by goaltenders at both ends to render the rest of the period scoreless. The first minute of the period proved fatal again for Guelph as the M and Ms scored at the 37-second mark of period two on a goal by Duane Lewis aided by Guistini and Butt.

Although the local majors had numerous scoring opportunities, it took them until the 12:11 mark of the third frame for their third and final marker when Elinesky scored on a nice three-way passing play from Hills and Crawford. A sparkling performance was turned in by Peter Downs who was called upon to make a number of difficult saves between the pipes and he proved equal to the task to register the shutout for Georgetown.

Game two against North York Canadiens proved to be the downfall of the M and Ms on Saturday morning when they dropped a 4-1 decision to the tough North York squad.

Although the Georgetown boys were marginally outplayed in this contest, the score was not indicative of the play. Poor officiating resulted in two goals being awarded to the Habs that shouldn't have. One was scored while the net was off its moorings and the other resulted when the official awarded a goal that didn't enter the net. Without these two goals against Georgetown, the M and Ms would have qualified for post round robin play as the wild card selection.

Georgetown's goal came at the 9:13 mark of the second period when "Lewy" Lewis converted an Elinesky pass for the score. John Katsilleris turned in a very strong performance in the nets for the M and Ms making numerous difficult saves.

Georgetown's final game of the tourney against a fast skating, close checking Ottawa squad was a pleasure to watch. The M and Ms knew they were in for a tough match since Ottawa had beaten North York earlier in the tournament. The boys reached down for that something extra and came up with a very gratifying 3-1 win.

Although the M and Ms came out a little flat in the first period and despite being outplayed, they survived the first period with a 1-1 tie. With Ottawa scoring midway through the period the M and Ms evened the score in the last minute when Elinesky scored on a fine pass out of corner from McIntyre.

With period two going scoreless Georgetown took change of the scoreboard in the third with two goals. Adam Hills scored from Peter Lee at the 4:23 mark of the period

and Elinesky notched the final marker late in the period from Hills to secure the victory at 3-1.

Coaches Hume and James were very pleased with the performance of their charges realizing that only bad luck prevented them from entering the playoff round.

In tri-county play earlier in the week, Georgetown dropped an 8-6 decision to Orangeville in a poorly played match by our local pucksters.

Coach Hume stated that unnecessary penalties, particularly talking penalties, were becoming a problem. In fact, Hume is considering surgery in one particular case to alleviate the problem. The parents, apparently, have given their surgical consent since it will solve their problem off the ice.

Following the Orangeville game the official was reported as saying, referring to Hume's problem, "I was willing to overlook the talking back until the player made reference to my mother and that's when I decided to tack on the extra two minutes."

The first period of the Orangeville game saw the M and Ms take a 4-3 lead on goals from McIntyre, Hills, Kosziwka and Lewis with assists going to Long, Elinesky, Curry, Guistini, Lewis, and McIntyre.

Orangeville bounced back to tie the score at 5-5 after two periods. The M and Ms managed one goal in the second period when Elinesky scored from Hills and Wright.

Georgetown, plagued with penalties, were outclassed in the third period when Orangeville outscored the hometowners, 3-1 to take the win. The M and Ms lone goal of the period came when Elinesky scored from Hills and Crawford.

Programs include Children's Playgrounds, Day Camps, Sport Camps, Drama and various swimming programs. Senior staff are required to assist with all these activities. The following are positions we are accepting applications for. Deadline is Friday, Dec. 9.

Co-ordinator/Senior Supervisor: One position; minimum 20 years of age preferred; May through August. Position involves overseeing the whole summer program operation (excluding aquatics). Responsibilities include hiring of staff, organizing programs, publicity and general administrative duties.

Supervisors: Minimum 18 years of age preferred; May through August. Positions available for

people to supervise, plan and organize all program areas.

Senior Supervisors (Aquatics): Three positions; minimum 20 years of age preferred; current R.C./R.L.S.S.C. instructors and N.L.S.; First Aid Certificate and C.P.R.; May through Labor Day. Position involves overseeing the Aquatic Programs at each of our facilities (two indoor pools, one outdoor pool, a wading pool and a beach front). Responsibilities include hiring of staff, staff scheduling and training, general administrative duties (budgeting, report writing, etc.).

All staff hired will be required to attend training sessions in June.
