# Sabre players clear the air to ice strong performance

A therapeutic team meeting helped the Action Sabres put together one of their best efforts of the season in Mid-Ontario Jr. C Hockey League play last Friday night in Acton.

Despite losing the contest, 7-5 to the Caledon Flyers, both coach Ken Steen and general manager Robin Inascoe were pleased with the Sabres performance.

"It was a good game, the guys played well," said Steen on Saturday. "They played the way they are capable of playing," echoed Inascoe.

The improved outing against the league's hot-shooting second place Flyers came after a disastrous performance in Alliston last Wednesday night that saw the Sabres lose 5-2.

"We stunk the joint out in Alliston," said Inascoe. Sabre players held a team meeting prior to Friday's contest to air some feelings and to discuss what the squad needed to do to improve upon a 2-11 record. "We've just got to work on a few things," said Inascoe. "We're playing good, entertaining hockey and we're not filling up the penalty box. The wins have got to come."

On Friday, Sabres were down 4-1 after 30 minutes but roared back to force a 5-5 tie heading into the third

period. A three-goal outburst in a two-minute span of period two gave Acton a brief 5-4 lead before the end of the frame.

Caledon potted what proved to be the winning tally at 7:56 of the final period and added an empty-netter at 19:45 with netminder Dean Bower on the bench in favor of an extra-attacker.

Acton just missed tying the contest at 6-6 when Todd Shimirk drilled a shot off the post with 20 seconds remaining, just prior to the Flyers' empty-net insurance goal.

Shimirk notched one goal for Ac-

ton while other singles went to Wayne Rivers, Sean O'Connell, Ian Ellis and Mike Nelles. Assists went to Steve Wagner (2), Ian Ellis, Troy Foster, Jason Lucas, Wayne Rivers and Sean O'Connell.
