Local man forges ahead

David Carter, son of Joan and Ormie Carter of Norval, was successful recently in his proposal to develop a hydro-electric generating facility on the north shore of Lake Superior near Marathon.

David, in partnership with the Pic-Heron Bay Indian Band, was given the official go-ahead by Vince Kerrio, Minister of Natural Resources, at a ceremony in Thunder Bay Nov. 17. The \$20 million development will take two years to complete and will generate 12.5 megawatts of power. David and the Pic-Heron Bay Band's joint venture company, Begetekong Power Corporation, will lease and develop the Crown-owned site. The development will have a low environmental impact and will help the Band to improve its socioeconomic condition.

David is rapidly becoming recognized as a major force in the hydro development field. Two years ago, along with Neil Korzack, formerly of Glen Williams and now of Toronto, and Mark Stubbert of Rockwood, he formed the company Sundridge Power, that purchased and operates three power sites near Dryden in Northwestern Ontario.

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
