

## Gym club vaults forward

The Georgetown Raiders Jr. B Hockey Club is not the only local sports organization that has opted

for a new look in 1968. The Halton Hills Gymnastics Club has also sprouted a new profile this year and it's one the local club hopes will soon draw as much fanfare as

that of the much-improved Raiders. "It's a whole new look, straight across the board," says head coach Paula Geniole, herself an integral

Georgetown-based gymnastics club, formally known as the Halton Hills

part of the club's transformation. At the end of the 1987 season the Jilla, decided to hire a fultime coach in the person of Milton native

Her arrival signalled a sweep of changes in the club, beginning with the dropping of the name Jills and the official adoption of the name Halton Hills Gymnastics Club Inc.

With the new name also came a new commitment to improving the club, both physically and competitively. Physical changes included the installation of a new tumbling floor, updated uneven bar equipment and renovations which included a completely new paint job for the Memorial Arena-based club.

Geniole also shed the club's previous navy and green color scheme for a bold new combination of black, pink and royal blue

"We're good and we're going to show it," says an enthusiastic

Competitively, Geniole wants Halton Hills to be able to put its best foot forward in regional, provincial and ultimately, national level competition. "This province is going to be shocked," said Geniole. "We've

come very far." Geniole's rabid enthusiasm and commitment to her first professional fulltime assignment has paid off so far. Membership in the 12-year old club is up by over 100 per cent from last year. In 1987 the club had 85 members while this year the organization boasts 185.

Geniole hopes the trend will continue and that someday the club can move into more roomier confines than those afforded by the Rose Room above Memorial Arena.

"Most gyms have about 10-13,000 square feet to work with," she said. "We've probably got between 5-10,000.

But Geniole will take what she's got for the time being and she's not hesitant in placing the lion's share of the credit for the club's seeming rebirth squarely on the shoulders of some pretty hardworking parentvolunteers.

members from age one and a half years to 20 in programs ranging from Kindergym to Competitive.

Gymnasts are placed in classes according to age and ability with the majority entering in the recreational, or non-competitive, stream. Gymnasts can try out at any time for a spot on the competitive team which currently has eight girls working under Geniole's tutelage, three in competitive and five in precompetitive.

The club trains from mid-July straight through to the following June with only about two to three weeks off in the summer. The competitive season goes from December to May, and gymnasts work hardest during that time span.

"They're in the gym about 13 hours a week," said Gentole.

The club's three competitive gymnasts, Tracey Clark, Marcey Macinnes and Darby Erler, competed in their first regional meet last weekend and will see action in two more before the end of the competitive season

All three athletes say they were first attracted to the gruelling sport by watching the 1980 Olympic exploits of American star Mary-Lou Retton on TV.

"It's tiring, but it's worth it," says Darby, 13, of the training and competition. The Centennial school Grade eight student competes in Tyro B while Trucey and Marcey compete in Tyro C (Tyro A is the highest competitive level).

"K.ds at school think it's neat when you can do tricks like cartwheels and the splits," says Marcey. Tracey says the sport requires "a lot of dedication" and Darby agreed. saying, "it teaches you not to quit."

About the only drawback seen in the sport by the trio was dieling. "Keeping your weight down can be tough, especially when you like pizza," quipped Darby.

Meanwhile, Geniole, who studied at Seneca College's High Performance Gymnastics Teaching School, has still loftler goals in sight for the Halton Hills club than the short term ones already achieved.

"I'd like to see us expand like 90," she exclaimed. "I'd like to see this club reach 500 members."

Geniole says she dreams of a Halton Hills school of the arts somewhere in the future where local student athletes could study academics and train for gymnastics under the same roof. But her realistic self also understands the inherent problems associated with local smalltown non-profit clubs.

"Most clubs in the States are multi-million deltar outfits and most in Canada are non-profit," she says. "To make money in Canada you almost have to slay strictly recreational."

All of the renovations and changes made within the Halton Hills club were as a direct result of memberships and fundraising, said Geniole.


"We sell raffle tickets, we had 200 kids turning cartwheels in the Santa Claus parade and they were all sponsored, and we sell chocolate bars."

Geniole herself finds she is almost living at the gym but her enthusiastic approach to the game won't allow her to coach at any speed but full out.

She receives help from valued assistants such as Kate Jennings, Elaine Ewen, Jennifer Arnold, Faith Richardson, Katherine Wilson and Sherilyn Kirkpatrick, Her competitive gymnasts of today will hopefully stay with the sport to be tomorrow's coaches, says Geniole.

"It's a sport I believe in," she says. "It works kids from head to toe. Kids have to be in shape and they have to be smart, it takes a lot of mental preparation. I'd like the community to see how important it is for kids."

With the strides the club has already made toward a higher profile it may not take the community much longer to sit up and take

## Raider trio wooed by U.S. college hounds

A pair of Georgetown Raiders could become Flashes next year and a third member of the Jr. B squad could be stopping pucks in upstate New York.

Chuck Loreto, Don Cruise and Todd King were contacted by officials from a pair of American university hockey teams at the conclusion of last week's heavilyscouted Henry Carr Jr. B Tournament at the Weston Lions Archa.

Loreto and Cruise, linemates for the past two seasons, met Bill Beard, an assistant coach from the State University Kent Flushes, while netminder King was contacted by a scout from Plattsburgh State University in New York. All three Raider players may be offered hockey scholarships to the respective schools next season.

"It was pretty exciting at the tournament, there were scouts everywhere," said Cruise. "Mr. Beard asked us questions about our grades and gave us a basic idea of the Kent State program. He talked to my parents and said he'd be back to scout Chuck and me later in the season."

Kent State, playing Division I hockey out of Kent, Ohio, ran Into a blt of notoriety this season when the entire hockey program was barred from competition for one year after senior players were charged with breaking the state's anti-hazing laws.

Cruise was introduced to a Kent State representative last season but the meeting with Beard was his first formal information session regarding the possibility of receiving a full hockey scholarship. "It's as good a calibre of hockey

as you'll find outside of pro," said Cruise who spectated at a Miami of Ohio game last year, "They get some big crowds as well."


All indications point to Kent State being interested in Cruise and Loreto attending the U.S. coliege and playing as linemates. "We're really used to each other after being on the same line for two years," said Cruise. "That would be great if we could go down there and play on the same line," agreed Loreto.

Last season both Loreto and Cruise were scouted by Hamilton College in New York and Loreto is still expecting to hear from Merrimack College near Boston.

Loreto had 31 goals and 42 assists for Georgetown last season while Cruise potted 15 goals and 25 assists. The 18-year-olds both attend GDHS.

Meanwhile, another 18-year-old who will graduate from Grade 13 at Georgetown next spring, Todd King, was met by a scout representing Plattsburgh State.

"He sounded pretty sincere when he asked me if I was in-





terested in a scholarship," said King of the Plattsburgh agent. "I'm really interested in obtaining one, that's one of the main reasons I came back to Georgetown this scason."

Plattsburgh was a top club in Division II last year and plays a competitive program against some of the east coast's toughest U.S. collegiate teams.

Last year King, a former member of the Oakville Blades. received a letter from Lake Superior State University which subsequently went on to capture the NCAA title last season. "I guess I should've replied," he quip-

### Raiders lack production in three tournament losses

The Georgetown Raiders may have come out of the Henry Carr Jr. B Hockey Tournament with a boat load of confidence despite recording three losses in the annual Westonbased competition last week.

Raiders lost all three of their pool games and failed to earn a tournament playoff spot but an uncommon amount of bad luck around the opposition cage was about the only recurring complaint heard from the Georgetown squad.

"We seemed to have no luck around the net," said assistant coach Jay Anderson. "We just couldn't put anything in."

A lack of offence would appear almost foreign to this year's Raiders. The club has scored 121 goals in 21 league games so far, second only to Burlington in the western division with 138.

"We should've won all our games, but we didn't seem to be scoring,' sald goaltender Todd King. "I was pretty nervous, I thought I could've played better."

But what may have provided the Raiders with a shot of confidence was their performance against eastern division-leading Orillia. Georgetown met their Central league eastern rivals in both teams' final pool game and Orillia managed to eke out a 43 win.

"They didn't look like a first place team," said Anderson. "We can beat them."

Georgetown opened the tournament on the short end of a 3-0 score to the Metro Jr. loop's Bramalea Blues who eventually went on to cap-
