

Hilts provides O.T. winner in B final

Bantams win consolation

The Georgetown M and M Pro Sports Bantams travelled to Belleville last weekend and came home with the consolation championship.

The local pucksters had a great weekend of hockey and carted off the silver with three wins, one tie and one loss.

In the round robin play the M and Ms went undefeated with two wins and a tie. However, once more the local major bantams fell victim to the numbers game when they missed the division title to the host Belleville team.

Round robin play saw the M and Ms register wins against Rochester Midstate by a 7-3 score and Pickering by a 5-1 score. The tie came against the host Belleville team as the two teams "sister-kissed" to a 1-1 tie.

In the playoff round Georgetown lost a bid to go to the "A" championship when they dropped a 4-1 decision to a superior Ottawa Valley team. However, the boys captured the consolation crown with a 4-3 victory over a second Ottawa entry.

In game one against Rochester the M and Ms owned the scoreboard and romped to an easy 7-3 victory. With a little more effort the boys could easily have notched another four or five

goals. In retrospect this would also have given them the division title over Belleville.

Georgetown was a little slow out of the gate when the Americans scored at the 1:18 mark of the first frame. However Adam Hilts nullified that goal when he scored at 6:21 from Crawford and Ellnesky.

The second period proved disastrous for the Yanks as the M and Ms scored six goals in quick succession. On the first goal Hilts' line again went to work as Crawford scored from Hilts and Ellnesky. Georgetown's second goal of the period came on a fine individual effort by Sean Guistini who picked up the puck behind his own net, skated through the entire Midstate squad and tucked the biscuit in the basket.

Mitch Butt followed with an unassisted goal a minute later and Steve Wright netted the next from Kozziwka and Curry. The M and Ms popped in two more goals before the end of the second period, the first Hiltsy from Ellnesky and the final marker by Duane Lewis from McIntyre. Rochester notched the only goal of the third period to round out the score at 7-1. John Katsilleris was solid in the nets for the victorious M and Ms.

Game two matched the boys with Pickering and they had little problem disposing of them as they skated to a 5-1 victory.

In the first frame Trevor Ellnesky notched the only goal for the M and Ms, unassisted. Period two saw the teams exchange goals with Shaun Curry scoring from Mitch Butt for the locals. Georgetown took charge in the third period by scoring three unanswered goals. Adam Hilts was the triggerman on the first with assists going to Ellnesky and Lewis. Rob Lang notched the second of the period from Lewis and Guistini while Mark McIntyre rounded out the scoring with assists going to Hagen and Kozziwka. Peter Downs missed the nets for the M and Ms in this contest and was equal to the task.

In game three of the tourney the M and Ms ran into a hot goaltender and in spite of outshooting the opposition by a 3-1 margin could only muster a tie.

The goaltender for the host Belleville team played a masterful game between the pipes as he frustrated the Georgetown sharpshooters on numerous occasions.

The only goals of the game came in the second period when the two teams traded goals 20 seconds apart.

The Georgetown goal came on a scintillating shot from the point by Peter Lee with assists going to Crawford and McIntyre. The Belleville shooters also found Katsilleris tough to beat in the Georgetown net.

After qualifying as the wild card entry for post round robin play Georgetown drew Ottawa Valley in the semifinal match. Although the M and Ms had defeated the Valley squad in a previous tourney, Sunday afternoon would render a much different result as the M and Ms went down to defeat by a 4-1 score.

Georgetown's lone marker came in the first period when Ellnesky scored from Lang and Hilts. Despite being beaten four times, Downs turned in a very solid performance in the nets for Georgetown.

With only a half hour rest the M and Ms took the ice one more time

for the consolation championship game against Ottawa West.

The local bantams notched the only goal of the first period when Duane Lewis scored from Sean Guistini. Ottawa tallied early in the second to tie the score but Ellnesky put the locals back on top at the midway point assisted by Rob Lang. Again Ottawa tied the score late in the period taking the game into the final frame tied at 3-3. Sean Guistini put the M and Ms in the lead once more on a goal in the first minute of play on a fine pass from Mitch Butt. Ottawa nullified this goal with one of their own at the four minute mark and the game remained tied to the end of regulation time.

The M and Ms didn't wait long to sail this one away as Adam Hilts scored the winner at the 56-second mark of the first overtime period assisted by Lewis and Ellnesky to take the game and the consolation championship.

John Katsilleris had a strong performance in the nets for the locals, particularly late in the game with some sloppy defensive play in front of him. Rob Lang was instrumental with his strong defensive play with numerous solid hits and Gussy put another notch in his stick by taking out another goalie.
