# Region goes for their share in tourism

By the year 2000, the fast growing tourist industry will be the largest employer in the province. And Halton wants to grab its share of the tourist dollar.

Halton is spending more than it ever has on promotional programs but the Region, which has so much potential because it lies between Nlagara and Toronto, is losing ground to othe areas looking to attract tourists, Halton's business development officer Brent Kearse

"There is an increasing concern that Halton's promotional programs are not keeping pace with those of our surrounding communities," said Mr. Kearse. "As surrounding communities increase their tourism promotions, Halton's market slips away."

Halton spent an average of 38 cents per capita on tourism promotion in 1988.

London, which is roughly the same size as Haiton, spent \$3 per person and Hamilton-Wentworth, which is a substantially larger region than Halton, spent \$2.15 per person on tourism promotions this year, said Mr. Kearse.

Government dollars need to be poured into the industry, but "the public sector is casting fugitive glances at the private sector to make some commitments," he said. In order to do that the Region must

gain their trust, he said. "Before we can achieve a strong private sector component, we must gain their trust that Regional tourism is not a tentative project that is going to begin and end before it can see any achievable results."

A recent report showed that some 4.5 million visitors to Halton spend \$166 million in the Region in 1987. Because Halton is in a location which lends itself well to day trips from surrounding areas, more money should be spent on promotion, said Mr. Kearse.

Private sector contributions to tourism promotions totalled just \$38,000 this year, he said.

This year, Halton has published a brochure promoting the Region. Together with a variety of other promotions such as a tourism newsletter, special events, media publicity valued at about \$10,000, tours, more signs and attending and holding trade shows, Halton's profile is increasing, sald Mr. Kearse.

Next year, the second in a threeyear tourism blitz for Halton, the Region plans to publish a tourism

The directory will be a "who's who" guide for tourism to be used by the industry in planning bus tours and conferences, said Mr. Kearse.

Mr. Williams, former superintendent of Employee Services replaced Wally Beevor as Director of Education when Mr. Beevor was appointed to

the Ministry of Education. Mrs. Laing will leave the Halton Board Dec. 31 and begin duties as Director of Education for the Durham Board of Education in Oshawa.

Mr. Williams' former duties were taken over by Joanne Zywine, Manager of Human Resources and Sue Currie, Supervising Manager of Employee Services.
