
# Outlook on Halton Hills


Police hunt VCR thieves

### Auto electronics surging ahead

(NC)-By the 1991 model year, the electronic content of automobiles will increase 100 percent compared with 1988-model-year vehicles, according to engineering specialists at General Motors of Canada. By the mid 1990s we will probably see an "electronic chariot" with an electronics centre that controls hundreds of functions, from anti-lock brakes and power steering to in-car navigation and voice-actuated vehicle systems.

As the number of major electronic functions doubles every five years, experimental and development work for future cars is surging ahead at Delco Electronics, a subsidiary of General Motors' Hughes Electronics Corp. Delco is North America's number one supplier of automotive electronics and the world's largest producer of control computers.

At the heart of automotive electronic systems is the microprocessor. One example of what this tiny but highly sophisticated unit does: develop "active suspension" control for a high per-



formance, smoother, more stable ride under any conceivable road or handling situation. By using a microprocessor, signals from wheel, engine and body sensors can be analyzed to execute split-second suspension system changes without any driver input.

As the number of applications proliferate, space and cost limitations have force automotive engineers to focus their efforts on smaller computers with more highly integrated circuitry, fewer connections and increased reliability. At the same time, those microprocessors must accommodate more functions with greater levels of complexity and sophistication for trouble-free motoring.
