The Georgetown Little Theatre is gearing up for the presentation of its second show of the regular season, *Night Must Fall*, a mystery by Emyln Williams. Director Ron Hill has announced a strong and experienced cast for GLT's Festival entry.

Ron Hill does have a problem, however. The man who was cast in the male lead as Dan, now finds because of work requirements that he can't fulfill his obligation. Now on with the cast.

The play is set in England in the 1930s and the action takes place in the cottage of Mrs. Bramson (played by Vera MacDonald). Staying with Mrs. Bramson is her niece, Olivia (Margi Gibson) and dropping in to minister to Mrs. Bramson's hypochondria is Nurse Libby (Adele Armstrong). Mrs. Terence, the cook (Margaret Eggleton), and Dora, the maid (Jacky Willows) help to keep the household running. Making their appearances in the cottage we have Hubert (Doug Ladouceur) who is trying to interest Olivia in his many attributes, Inspector Belsize (Ron Hunt) who is questioning members of the group with respect to a murder investigation and Dan who has been brought in to see Mrs. Bramson to make sure that he does the right thing by the pregnant Dora.

The play, being set in the 1930s, is already providing a challenge

for producer Linda Parker since the ultimate responsibility for set-dressing and procuring all the little knick-knacks falls to her. The generous people of Georgetown and area have helped out before and may be the best resource around. The character of Mrs. Bramson is confined to a wheelchair so this production is in need of a 1930s style wheelchair. More funding announced

Education Minister Chris Ward has announced increased funding for the province's school boards for their budget year of January to December, 1989.

Treasurer Robert Nixon recently announced a 6.1 per cent increase in the annual transfer payments for elementary and secondary school education.

The boards will receive a total of \$4.1292 billion next year, an increase of \$237.5 million over the 1988 allocation, Mr. Ward said.

The 1989 transfer payments include an enrichment of \$81.5 million toward implementation of the 1987 Throne Speech commitments.

The enrichment funds are for the reduction of class sizes in Grades 1 and 2, the ministry's revitalized computers in education program, new textbooks, more learning materials and the introduction of science programs in the intermediate division.

"This brings to \$145.8 million the amount we are spending in 1989 on these important improvements in elementary education," Mr. Ward said.

Besides operating grants, the government has committed, for next year, an additional \$300 million for school capital projects.

"I am confident that the total 1989 provincial allocations will provide school boards with the means to continue to deliver high quality education for our children," the minister said.

Tasty Recipes CHOCODILES

- 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 1/4 cups brown sugar, packed
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/3 cup crunchy peanut butter
- 1 egg yolk, beaten
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine flour, brown sugar, salt, butter, shortening and peanut butter. Mix, using low speed of mixer, until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add egg yolk and vanilla; mix well.

Press mixture firmly into ungreased 15"x10"x1" jelly roll pan. Bake at 350° about 25 minutes, or until golden. Cool slightly.

TOPPING:

- 1 c. semi-sweet choc. chips
- 1/2 cup crunchy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup coconut

Melt chocolate chips in top of double boiler over hot water. Stir in crunchy peanut butter and coconut. Spread chocolate mixture over base. Let stand at room temperature until chocolate hardens. Cut into bars or squares. Makes 3 to 4 dozen.
