

Highlights of publishing for 1988

Here is a roundup of notes on some of the highlights of this year in publishing:

—Extraordinary Light: A Vision of Canada, by Sherman Hines (Sumnerhill Press; 144 pages; \$50 in slipcase) Here are more than 130 of the best photographs taken by this award-winning artist during his 20 years of publication. Hines, a 47-year-old Nova Scotia photographer, has a passion for travel, for the outdoors and for the extraordinary light that Nature sometimes displays.

That light is an element that each of his photographs possesses, whether it be a close-up of a lily pad or a prairie sky that stretches to infinity. An informative introduction has been contributed by Ellen Vanstone. This first printing is being distributed by the Canadian Booksellers Association.

—Images, by Len Gibbs (NC Press; 121 pages; \$29.95). An unusual and handsome production, this volume combines 40 of the highly realistic paintings that Gibbs is noted for, with excerpts from some 30 stories by popular Canadian and US writers such as Morley Callaghan, Farley Mowat and W.O. Mitchell. Gibbs, 59, also contributes a few paragraphs in which he explains how he gets the spark of an idea for a painting, and then discusses the multiple stages leading to the finished work - usually acrylic, always refreshingly free of the influence of fads and fashions.

—Treasures (Firefly Books; 180 pages; \$29.95). From the enormous collection of images and artifacts

held by the Canadian Museum of Civilization, the publishers have showcased dozens of representative works for inclusion in this large-format volume of photographs and anecdotes about the creators. The selection is nothing if not wide-ranging - from ancient clocks to Victorian quilts, from pottery to present-day pop art. Production is outstanding, and text is in both of official languages.

—The Architecture of Arthur Erickson (Douglas and McIntyre; 228 pages; \$65). Vancouver-born Erickson has won worldwide recognition in his 64 years for his innovative and exciting designs such as the beautiful Robson Square law courts, the 2,812-seat Roy Thomson Hall, and the Canadian Chancery in Washington. This large-format, meticulously designed volume is an enduring tribute to his art and his skill, and an absorbing first-person account of the numerous considerations that guide his style - one of the most important being the local quality of the light.

—Land of the Midnight Sun, by Ken S. Coates and William R. Morrison (Hurtig; 336 pages; \$25.95). Subtitled *A History of the Yukon*, this is a richly detailed panorama of the territory from pre-history, through the colorful gold-rush era of dance-hall girls and Dangerous Dan McGrew, on to the Second World War era with the arrival of hordes of US soldiers, and up to the natural-resource and tourism booms of recent years that have been Whitehorse transformed into a modern, cosmopolitan community.

—A Wild Old Man on the Road, by Morley Callaghan (Stoddart; 181 pages; \$19.95). A new Morley Callaghan novel is always a major, and welcome, event in Canadian literature. In the 60 years that have passed since his formative period in Paris and the publication of his first novel, the Toronto-based writer has constantly grown in stature.

In this, his first novel in three years, Callaghan portrays the final years of a "wild old man" in conflict with aspects of himself, especially

with the idealistic young man he used to be. An intriguing story, rich in atmosphere, that will make readers impatient for his next.

—Child Star: An Autobiography, by Shirley Temple Black (McGraw-Hill Ryerson; 546 pages; \$27.50). Shirley Temple, born in 1928, became the biggest star in Hollywood in the mid-1930s, easily capturing the title of America's Sweetheart (a title that had once belonged to Canadian Mary Pickford). Here, in the first part of a projected two-volume autobiography, she details her rise from a three-year-old cutie in short subjects, through her elevation to stardom at Paramount at the age of six, and on to her 22nd year when she appeared in her last film, obtained a divorce, had a baby and remarried.

Told without a ghost writer, her story is full of captivating detail of the life of a singular young girl who seemed to bring out either the best or the worst in everyone she encountered as she grew up. Copiously illustrated.

KNOX PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH — ACTON

Presbyterians met at Boston Church on the 3rd Line of the Scotch Block until 1884 when an Acton congregation started to meet in the school house. A manse was built in 1891 on Willow Street. In 1894 a new red brick Church was built. It was dedicated on Feb. 24, 1895. Preaching in Gaelic was abolished and an organ introduced into the service. In the 1930's, stones from the "Old Pioneer Cemetery" located behind the church, but closed in 1886, were made part of the present cairn.
