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## Biathlon route OK'd

A proposed biathlon route was approved by Halton Hills councillors Jan. 9 despite concerns about the safety of the route and liability insurance.

Gerry Bruce, of Triathlete Promotions asked for permission to use two town roads for a combined nine-kilometre run and a 46-kilometre bicycle ride for the 21/2 hour event which would start and end at Stewarttown School.

The event, which is scheduled for 10 a.m. Aug. 13, should draw between 100 and 150 competitors, said Mr. Bruce.

The main roads used in the event will be Sideroad 22, Highway 25, Sideroad 15 and Trafalgar Road.

Coun. Alf Spence wants to make sure the biathlon organizers pay for the eight police officers needed for the day, and to make sure the organizers have adequate insurance coverage.

Coun. Joe Hewitt is not happy with the use of Trafalgar Road at the intersection of Sideroad 15. "This is probably the most dangerous intersection on Trafalgar Road and on top of this Sunday at 3 p.m. (when organizers will clean up) the cottagers will be coming home," he said.

"This section of Trafalgar Road concerns me."

Town administrator clerk Dan Costea said the town has adequate coverage as a third party for the event under its blanket coverage.

And payment for police officers needed for the day is strictly between the police force and the organizers, he said.

Permission to use the proposed route is still required from Halton Region and the Ministry of Transportation and Communication.

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
