Region decides to become a real PAL

That is "Operation PAL" and it stands for Public Alert. Union Gas Co. Ltd. has been operating the PAL network for several years and Halton agreed to join in Wednes-

In PAL, drivers of vehicles belonging to utilities, such as Halton, will keep their eyes open

- -people in obvious distress;
- -lost children;
- -suspicious activities in progress; -crimes in commission;
- -concerns affecting other utilities or municipalities.

Utilities such as Union Gas and Halton Region are "in a position to notify the appropriate authorities much earlier than might otherwise -be the case," Lays Halton's public works commissioner Robert Moore.

The PAL program has been endorsed by police departments throughout Southern Ontario. In all, 3,000 vehicles from 38 different municipalities are providing information to over 100 police detachments, through the use of their radio-equipped vehicles throughout Ontario.

Because all the vehicles are equipped with radios, it gives police departments thousands of extra eyes on the community, PAL's advocates say.


However, operators do not get physically involved in anything. They merely report incidents to their dispatchers, who in turn, call the police.

Residents who notice problems with utilities, such as a broken crosswalk light, can report it to any PAL vehicle driver who will then notify the dispatcher. The proper organization is then informed of the problem.

Citizens will be able to recognize PAL vehicles by decals with the letters PAL and the logo, two shaking hands, on the side.

Union Gas will hand out material, vehicle decals and train personnel at no cost to municipalities, said Mr. Moore.

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

BUTTERSCOTCH **TAPIOCA**

- 3 tbsp. quick cooking taploca
- 1/8 tsp. salt - 2 cups milk
- 1 tbsp. butter —
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar
- ¼ cup finely chopped pecans

Mix tapioca, salt and milk in a heavy bottomed pan and let stand for 5 minutes. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly for about 6 minutes, until the mixture comes to a full boil; remove from heat. Melt the butter in a small skillet and stir in the brown sugar. Cook over moderate heat, stirring until the sugar melts and bubbles for 1 minute. Stir in-the tapioca mixture and add the pecans. Serve warm or cold. Serves 4 to 6.
