Finely sculpted characters highlight Night Must Fall

"Night Must Fall" by Emyln Williams is the next production being presented by the Georgetown Little Theatre. It opens at the John Elliott Theatre on Feb. 17 and runs through Feb. 18, 22, 23, 24 and 25. This play is a murder mystery which has romance, philosophy and thrills thrown in for good measure.

On speaking at rehearsal with director Ron Hill I found out about the author Emyln Williams. It seems that Mr. Williams was a brilliant playwright in his '20s when he wrote his two best known plays. "Corn is Green" was one of his hits and it was made into a movie with Bette Davis in the starring role. "Night Must Fall" was his other big hit and it too was made into a movie in the 1940s with Robert Montgomery playing Dan. It seems that Mr. Williams was a shrewd man as well as an excellent playwright. He wrote "Night Must Fall" with himself in mind as the actor to play Dan, and he portrayed Dan when the play opened. I don't think that I would have relished being Mr. Williams' director. It seems that after the first two hit plays Emyln Williams faded fast and did not have another success. He toured North America as Charles Dickens in a one-man show. The basic elements of his plays that cause them to endure are his effective building of the play and his finely sculpted characters which made them absolute joys for actors to portray. "Night Must Fall" is a favorite for many theatre groups for just these reasons.

I also had a chance to speak with one of the many people behind the scenes. Carolyn Hooper is the Head of Costumes for this play and comes to GLT with experience in many departments including having done costumes for Globe's productions of "Mame," "L'il Abner" and "Brigadoon." This certainly represents exposure to a wide

variety of costume needs from kilts to coveralls. Carolyn won a Thea from the Association of Community Theatres of Central Ontario for the costumes in "Brigadoon." She is bringing the same enthusiasm to this production in her search for authentic-looking 1930s garb. The current women's styles of the 1980s are harkening back to the '30s with the resurgence of the tight mid-length skirt with approximately eight inches of pleating or a flare at the bottom. Since the budget doesn't run to buying new clothes Carolyn is looking around for volunteers who might have skirts like this and be willing to lend them to GLT for the duration of the play.
