
In a high-scoring game complete with a nailbiting finish, the Celtics outlasted the 76ers, 71-70.

Adam Bennett's stock continues to rise in the National Hockey League.

According to statistics from the NHL's Central Scouting Bureau released in the Toronto Star last Wednesday, the 17-year-old Georgetown native is now ranked fifth in North America among all draft-eligible players.

The CSB's list includes players from all three of Canada's major junior leagues, 'U.S. college and high school leagues and all other junior "A" loops on the continent who are eligible for the NHL entry draft next spring.

Bennett, currently toiling with the OHL's Sudbury Wolves, is ranked second in the Ontario circuit by the CSB behind only Scott Thornton, a centre with Belleville. Thornton is ranked second on the North American list.

Bennett was the first pick, second overall, of the Wolves in last summer's midget priority draft. The 6-foot-4, 208-pound rearguard has already been contacted by both the Vancouver Canucks and Washington Capitals.


