Time running out for Sabres

Time's running out for the Acton Sabres and general manager Robin Inscoe doesn't need to be reminded.

The Sabres closed out their regular season last week in the Mid-Ontario Jr. C hockey circuit. Thursday, they defeated Grand Valley 5-3, while Friday, with just 10 skaters suited up, they were buried 18-3 in Orangeville by the regular season champion Crushers.

The Sabres now find themselves a game back in their best-of-seven quarter-final playoff series, after dropping the openr 6-1 in Bradford Sunday.

Inscoe is aware that for the

Sabres to see any success against the Bulls, they'll have to make a few changes in strategy.

"They (Bradford) are a physical hockey club and we are not," he said following their loss. "We're going to have to play their game. We have to forecheck well, and get them looking over their shoulders. If we can keep their scoring down, I think it could prove interesting."

Bradford finished the regular schedule in second with a 27-9 winloss record, while the Sabres finished 7-28-1 and were sixth in the seven-team loop.

Despite the differential of close to 40 points in the standings, the Sabres have had some solid outings against the Bulls over the course of the regular schedule.

Sunday, they again kept it close, trailing just 3-1 early in the third, before giving up three unanswered goals.

The biggest problem in trying to better the Bulls is keeping a lid on their balanced scoring attack, according to Inscoe;

Six different players scored for Bradford Sunday, and that's pretty much been the secret to their success all season.

"Their scoring's well spread out," Inscoe says. "We can't key on a particular line with them. They had six guys who scored between 50 and 60 points (in the regular season) so it's a balanced attack."

In Sunday's match-up, the, Sabres trailed 1-0 after the first, and 3-0 after the second.

Kevin Ritchie finally put Acton on the scoresheet at the 59-second mark of the third, when he tallied from Steve Wagner to close the gap to 3-1. But the Bulls replied with three more to round out the 6-1 final.

The contest was anything but tame as four players aside were ejected mid way through the second period for a flare-up.

Jim Mantione started the game in net for the Sabres but was one of the "ejectees," and was replaced by Alex Piazza when it was 3-0.

The second game of the series is slated for this Friday at the Acton Arena beginning at 8 p.m. Game 3 will be in Bradford Sunday at 7 p.m. and Game 4 is slated for 8:15 p.m. in Acton Monday.

In other playoff action, Orangeville opened their quarterfinal playoff with a 14-4 victory over the Grand Valley Harvesters.

Meanwhile. Caledon, Schomberg, and Alliston are embroiled in a round robin set that will decide the other two semifinalists.

Last Thursday, after a scoreless opening period, the Sabres pulled away from Grand Valley to take a 2-0 lead in the second, and went on to a 5-3 victory.

Kevin Elkins picked up a pair of goals while Paul Westaway and Bob Watson added singles. The fifth goal of the night was scored by Sean Sears, from Westaway and Paul McLeod. The three were called up from the Acton Midgets for the game.

Mantione went the distance in net for Acton.

Friday's match-up Orangeville turned into somewhat of a sideshow. League scoring champion Jamie Litt of the Crushers was within nine points of setting a league record of 143 points. Consequently, their big line was being double-shifted and the Sabres didn't have the manpower to turn back the attack.

Litt set the record en route to the 18-3 win.

The 5-Pin National Classified Bowling Championships are for all class of bowlers as each entrant is classified according to his or her own league average.


