# Chiefs ready for battle

The Georgetown Domtar Packaging Minor Peeewe "AA" Chiefs faced arch rival Milton in the second round of Ontario playdowns. A split in the first two games made the game Monday in Milton a sudden death contest.

On Saturday night at Memorial Arena the Domtar Packaging Chiefs came out flying and skated to a well deserved 3-0 first period lead. Doug Sheppard opened the scoring early for Georgetown on an excellent individual effort. On the same shift, Sheppard crossed the Milton blueline and made a fine pass to winger Mark Aldridge who cleanly beat the visiting goalie to make the score 2-0. Late in the period defenceman Brent Wilkinson intercepted a Milton pass inside his blueline, and skated the length of the ice to score on a backhand.

Georgetown backed off a little in the second period allowing Milton more skating room and the visitors took advantage closing the score to 3-2. The Minor Peeewe's didn't

panic and continued their disciplined play that allowed the visitors very few three-on-two rushes. A face-off in the Milton end saw centre Duane Erler and linemates Aldridge and Duke Bouskill keep the puck in front of the visitors' net

until it came free and Erler scored on a backhand shot. Milton closed to within 4-3 with two minutes left in the game, but the Domtar Packaging squad held on for a very well earned victory. Goaltender Chad Hughes was outstanding in the Chiefs' net.

In Milton on Sunday night the hosts turned the tables on the

Chiefs. During one shift late in the first period Milton scored two goals. They extended the lead to 5-0 by the midway point of the second

period. A third period goal by Sheppard assisted by Bouskill and Aldridge was all the offence the Minor Peeewe's could generate.

Chad Hughes and John Waller shared the goaltending duties for the Domtar Packaging side.

Coaches Chris Milne, Dan Curtis and Wally Petrie will stress a return to the disciplined style played by the Chiefs on Saturday night in the crucial Monday night game in Milton.

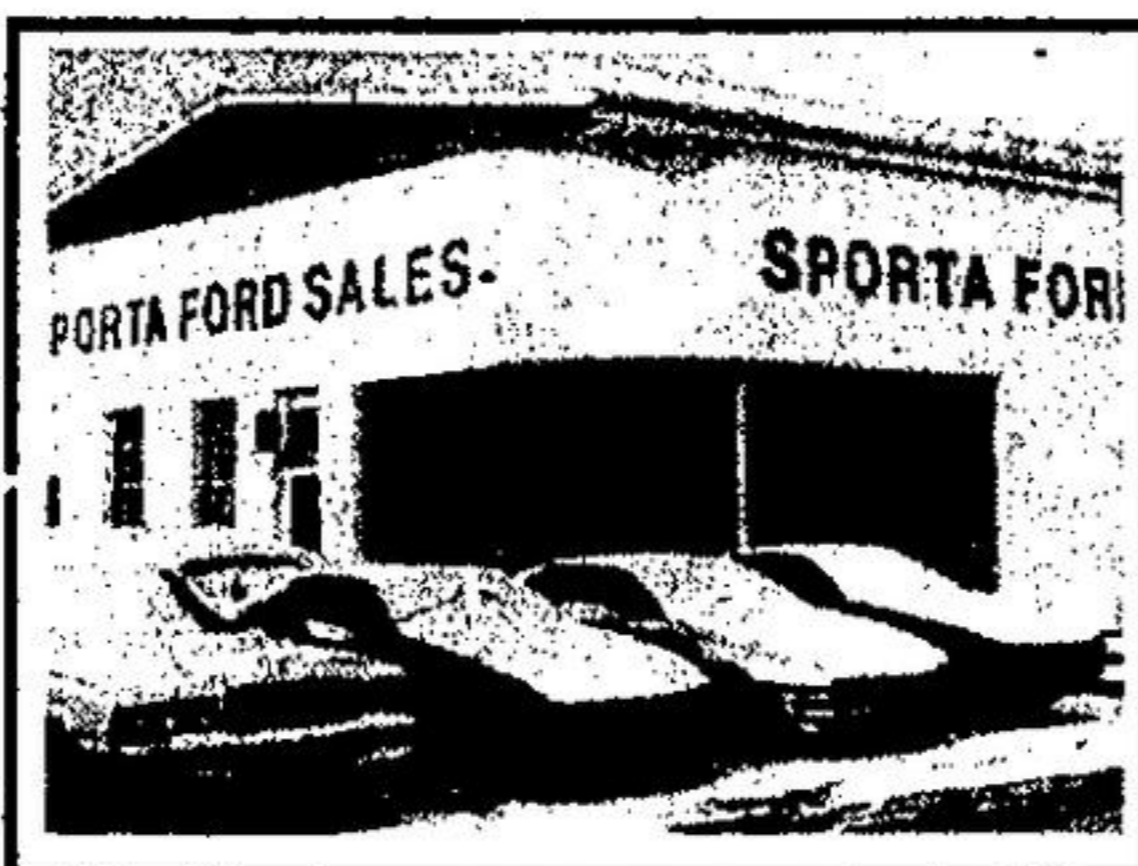
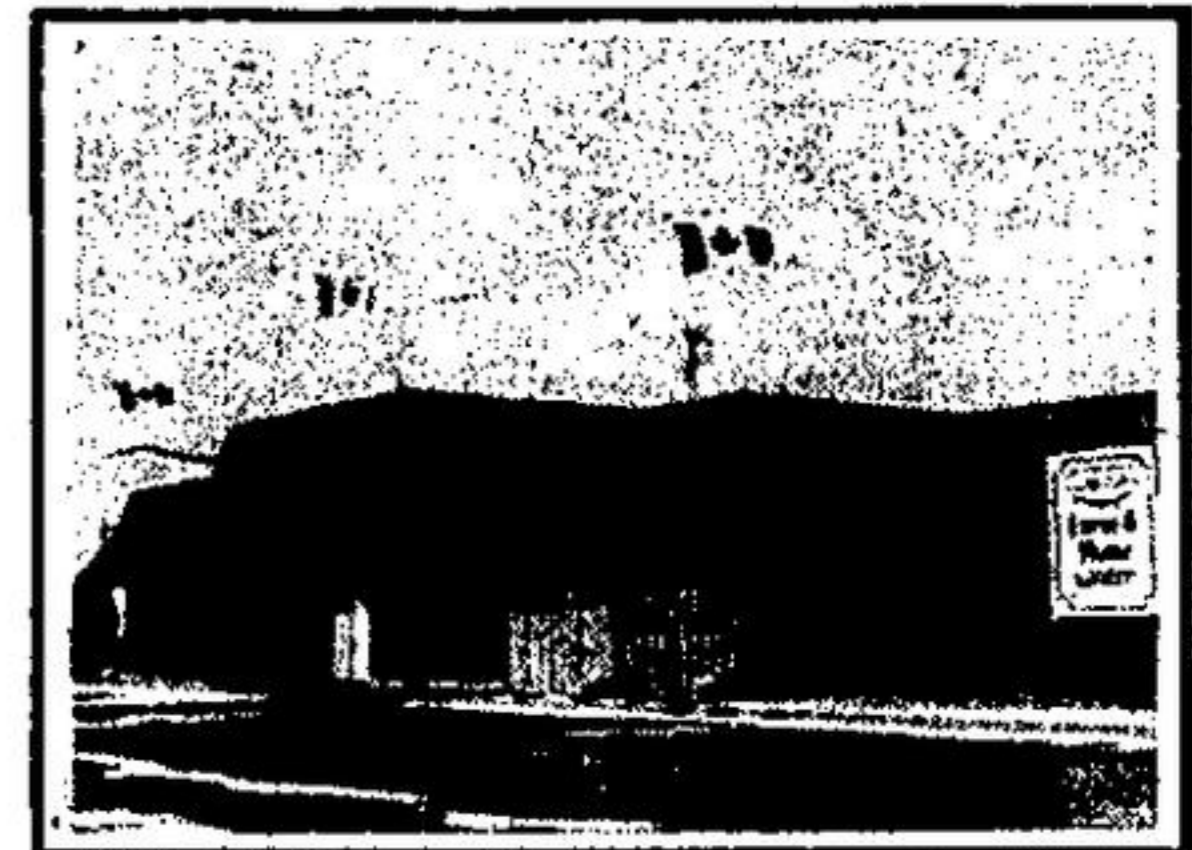
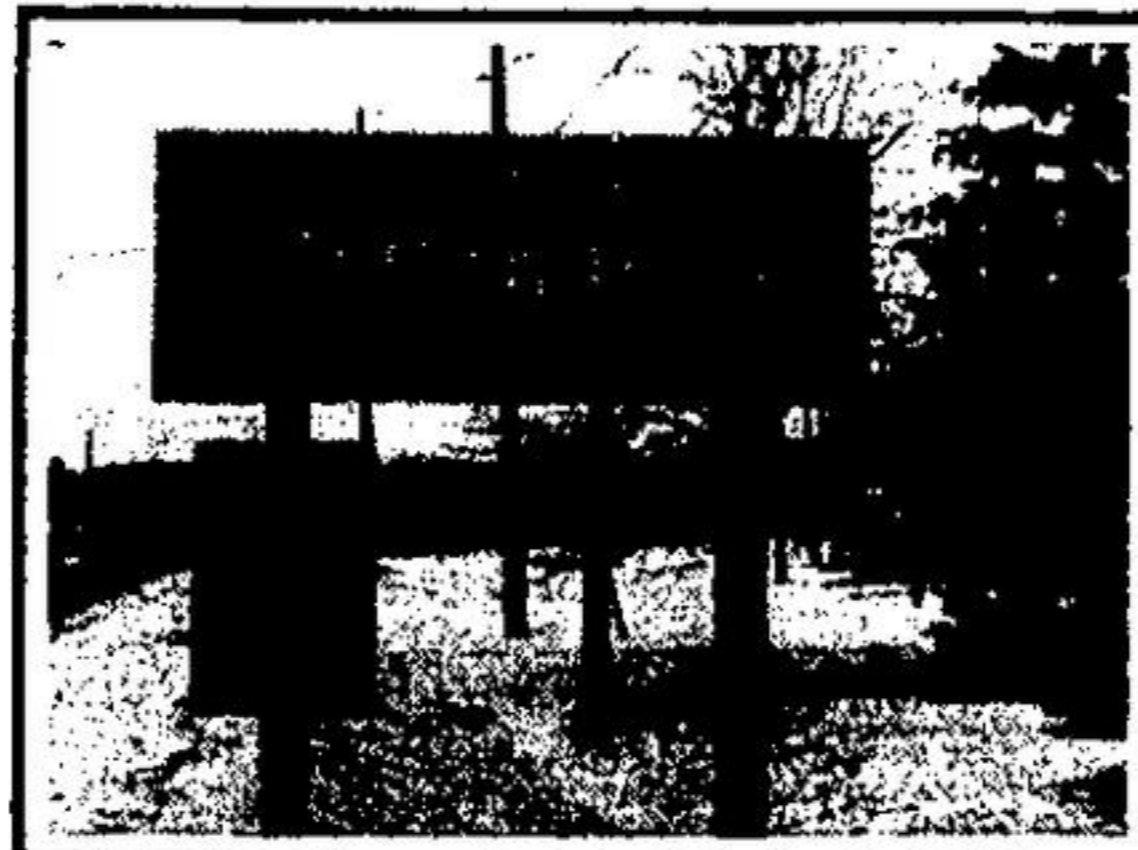
