

Director relates 'academic vision of the future'

Halton schools

Ever wondered what education will be like in the year 2000?

Halton Board of Education Director Bob Williams addressed 35 parents and teachers Thursday night at Park Public School in Georgetown, and presented an academic vision of the future.

"Halton's going to be a growth

area in the next 20 years," said Mr. Williams. "Halton's got land to feed that hungry animal, Toronto."

The north, in particular, has land. North Halton is not experiencing the space problems of their southern Regional counterparts Oakville and Burlington, said Mr. Williams.

Williams, but he predicts space problems in the north by the year 2000.

Classrooms that now have a capacity of 29 to 31 students could shrink in the future and could be filled with cross-sections of children at different ages, said Mr. Williams.

"We're getting schools that have a ratio of 12 to 1 - 12 students to one adult," said Mr. Williams, adding that more paraprofessionals and teachers per student would be beneficial.

The structure of student life could change. The classroom could

be divided not in terms of age groups, but how far a child has progressed when he or she first enters school.

The child would be placed in a classroom on the basis of ability rather than age.

"It's almost pathological (to place children in age groups). Cross-age grouping is a much better form of instruction," said Mr. Williams.

Mr. Williams said the school of the future would see more money spent in the elementary group "where the problems can be detected early," and on computer software to modernize the school system.

As far as putting all kindergarten to Grade 8 students under one roof, Mr. Williams said, "If I had a magic wand, I'd probably have K to 8 schools." But this may not happen, he said.

The Halton board, once described as "frugal," according to Mr. Williams, will have to cut more corners in the future as they lose a percentage of government funding each year.

"The provincial government's out of money. We're in a huge financial crisis right now," he said.

Schools, like one in California, could be put on trimester systems to rotate students and to save the school boards money.

But the board takes on increased responsibilities every year, said Mr. Williams. They are expected to be "custodians" of students, in addition to being teachers, he said. For example, when school is closed due to weather conditions, there is a panic, said Mr. Williams.

Students in the year 2000 will be connected with the outside world, said Mr. Williams. Arrangements will be made with the industrial sector to have "school-to-work" co-operative systems, he said.

The schools will no longer "fall miserably" with the 66 per cent of student population who leave high school to go directly to jobs.

But although Mr. Williams sees changes in Halton's future as a school board, he said he is proud of the system presently in place.

"We've just about solved the problem of educating youngsters," said Mr. Williams.

He said 91 per cent of students in Halton graduate from high school.

Junior Kindergarten

- Families registering for the first time at a school are requested to provide their family O.H.I.P. number at the time of registration.

Senior Kindergarten

Children are required to be 5 years of age on or before December 31, 1989.
