Waste hauling contract set

Halton Region will pay Jarsno Equipment Inc. more than \$7 million to haul its waste to an energy from waste plant and a landfill site over the next three years.

Jarsno will supply a fleet of 10 tractor-trailers to haul Halton's waste from a waste transfer station in Burlington, to Occidental Chemical Corporation in Niagara Falls, New York and a landfill site in Niagara Falls, Ont.

The contract with Jarsno is good until March, 1992, or until Halton opens its new landfill site in either Burlington or Milton.

Work planned for Sideroad 17

Halton Hills engineers are preparing Sideroad 17 for a \$775,000 reconstruction project to be done in 1991.

That year, Sideroad 17 is scheduled to be reconstructed between the Fourth and Fifth Lines.

To prepare for the work, the town will relocate several young trees, remove several trees completely and remove and replace highway fence and other fences in the area. The \$55,000 relocation project will be done this spring.

Some residents leery on water situation

Developers of a 313-lot subdivision in Georgetown South were given draft approval by the town of Halton Hills Monday but some area residents are still wary about the potential loss of their water supply.

The 90-acre Milran subdivision is located just west of the 10th Line adjacent to Halton Hills Village. At a public meeting late last year, residents worried that construction on the subdivision might interrupt their well water supply.

They pointed to a similar situation which occurred during the Meagan Developments subdivision in Glen Williams last year. In that instance a Wildwood Road couple lost their water while earth moving was occurring on the Meagan subdivision. The Wildwood Road couple said no tests were done on their well prior to the earth moving. Despite clauses in the subdivision agreement which were designed to protect their water supply, the residents could not collect money to hook up to town water from the developer, Halton Region or from the town of Halton Hills.

They were forced to draw water from a fire hydrant for several months.

But two clauses inserted into the subdivision agreement should provide adequate protection for the residents near Milran subdivision, said town planner Ian Keith Monday.

As a condition of the subdivision agreement, developers will have to submit a hydrogeological study detailing the impacts of development on any adjacent wells. As well, the developer will have to run a water monitoring program before any construction, including earth moving, begins on the site, said Mr. Keith.

The developer will have to provide a temporary water supply to any residents whose water is interrupted during construction, he said.

Although some councillors said they wanted the clauses worded more strongly, administrator clerk Dan Costea said the town's lawyer is drawing up a clause which would stand up to examination in court.

Tenth Line resident Jay Jackson said residents still question the water situation.

Residents are not sure how water would be provided, or who would pay the final costs, he said.
