

Police probe jewelry robbery

Over \$10,000 in jewelry stolen in the early hours of the morning is the subject of a continued investigation by members of the Halton Regional Police.

After responding to an alarm at approximately 4:30 a.m., Tuesday, Jan. 10, 1989, police discovered that the glass entrance door of Consumers Distributing, Steeles Avenue, Milton, Ontario had been smashed.

Culprit(s) then forced entry into a number of display cases, removing a variety of jewelry. Necklaces, earrings and pendants valued at over \$10,000 were stolen.

Identification officers were successful at gathering identifiable evidence from the scene.

Arrest made in coat theft

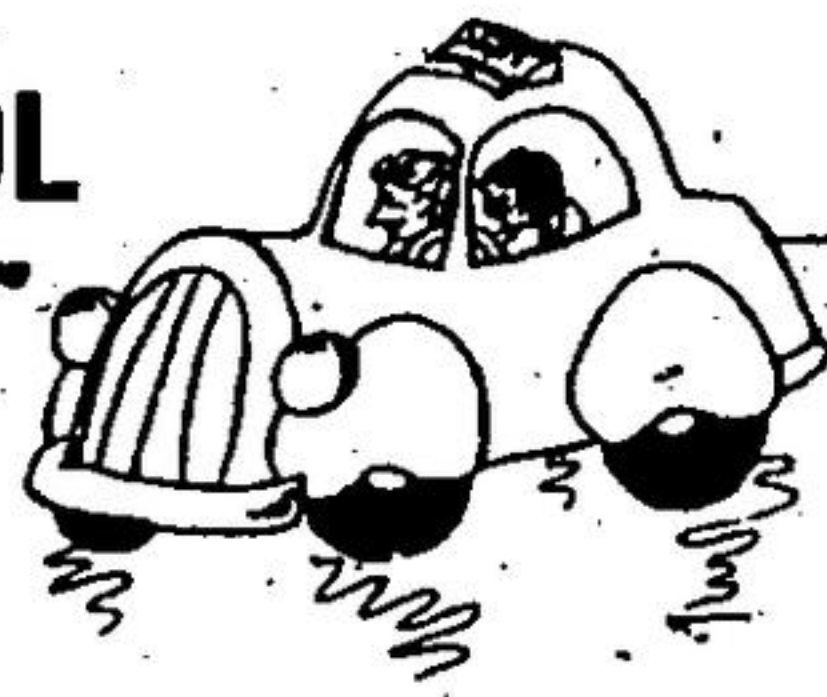
Two Kitchener residents were charged in connection with the theft of a \$1,400 beaver coat from the Olde Hide House in Acton Feb. 8.

NOTICE OF PASSAGE OF A BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills has enacted By-law No. 89-12 to designate "the Acton Town Hall" at 19 Willow Street, Acton on property described as Part of Lot 37, Block 3, Registered Plan 31 (formerly Town of Acton) more particularly described as Part 1, Reference Plan 20R-6577, as being of architectural and historical interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The hall was completed in 1883 and is a good example of the monumental style of the late 19th century architecture. The architectural significant features of the building include its monumental and symmetrical massing along the front and side elevations, its arched window openings, highlighted by decorative key end stones and moulded brick sides designed to resemble pilasters, its Italianate style roof trim featuring wide eaves with heavy shaped wooden brackets; the arched and brick pilaster trimmed front doorway and its wooden, detailed belfry tower.

HISTORICAL REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The historical interest of the property lies chiefly in the fact that it was the focal centre of the Town of Acton until Regional Government, as it acted as the community centre for virtually all Town of Acton related functions and services.

Police Beat

Car stripped

A car parked in Acton last week was "stripped" of an undetermined number of items, say Halton Regional Police.

A 1977 Ford Mustang owned by an Acton man was parked on Agnes Street between Feb. 7 and 8. The owner discovered some of the car's engine parts and an Alpine stereo system missing.

Police say an unknown suspect removed the car battery, eight spark plugs, the rotor, the distributor cap and transmission linkage.

Police say the car was likely unlocked at the time of the theft. They continue to investigate.

Car scratched

Halton Regional Police say \$800 damage was caused when someone scratched the side of a Pontiac Firebird parked near Back Street in Georgetown. The 1979 Pontiac was parked overnight in the municipal lot when an unknown person using an object similar to a key scratched the paint on the driver's side of the car.

\$100 damage

Police say damage was done to the interior of a car parked at Metcalfe Court in Georgetown Saturday night. A 1987 Accura parked in the driveway received \$100 damage when the glove box "was torn off its hinges," the rear hatchback cover was snapped,

the driver's door handles were broken, and the ashtray was damaged. Police are investigating.

Man charged

An Erin man was charged with careless driving after his van and a car collided in Glen Williams Saturday morning. Halton Regional Police say a 1987 Dodge van was southbound on Main Street and struck a parked 1986 Pontiac Sunbird with its hazard lights flashing. The van struck the Pontiac which then struck a third vehicle. The van was moderately damaged while the Sunbird was severely damaged. There were no injuries in the collision. An Erin man, 30, was charged under the Highway Traffic Act.

Correction

A story in the Feb. 8 edition of the Herald incorrectly identified a driver charged as a result of a traffic accident.

The incident was listed under the heading of "Minor damage" and involved an accident at Ninth Line and Sideroad 5.

The driver of the Mercury Cougar was not charged in the incident, as originally stated.

Teens injured

A group of local teenagers were injured after their car struck a pole and then a parked car in Glen Williams Jan. 31. The teens were travelling eastbound on

Tweedle Street when the car left the roadway, hit a utility pole and then hit a parked 1980 Chevrolet Malibu belonging to a Tweedle Street resident. The Malibu received light damage. The 1986 Chevrolet Celebrity driven by a Georgetown female, 17, was severely damaged. The driver and three passengers were taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital with minor injuries where they were treated and released.

Vehicles collide

An Acton female, 16, was charged with failing to stop after two cars collided in Acton Monday morning. A 1988 Plymouth was southbound on Churchill Road at Queen Street when it stopped and was struck by an eastbound 1971 Chrysler. The Plymouth received severe damage. The Chrysler was lightly damaged. Police report no injuries in the accident.

No injuries

Two cars were moderately damaged in a collision near Ashgrove Thursday morning. A 1974 Datsun driven by a Milton woman, 43, and a 1988 Plymouth van driven by an Acton man, 44, collided at the intersection of Sideroad 10 and Sixth Line. Police report no injuries. The Acton man was charged with failing to stop.

1989 TAXES INTERIM BILLING

In accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, pursuant to By-Law 89-7 adopted by Council on January 16th, 1989, the first two instalments of taxes for 1989 will become due as follows:

ALL WARDS - FIRST INSTALMENT - WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 22ND, 1989
- SECOND INSTALMENT - WEDNESDAY, APRIL 26TH, 1989

The above instalments represent an interim billing of 1989 taxes based upon an average of one-half of last year's residential mill rates. The final tax bill will be issued about the middle of the year and will also be payable in two instalments, normally the last Wednesday in June and September.

Upon default of payment of the interim levy as set out above, a penalty of one and one-quarter (1 1/4) percent of the amount in default shall be added on the first day of default and on the first day of each and every calendar month.

Ratepayers who have not received a tax bill should make immediate application at 36 Main Street South, Georgetown.
