Youths wanted for questioning

Halton Police are seeking information in regards to three youths seen in the area of a fire which caused \$50,000 damage to the Ecole Ste. Marie School, 336 Maurice Drive, Oakville.

At about 12:40 a.m., Saturday, Jan. 7 of this year, three youths were seen at the Ecole Ste. Marie school shortly before a fire was discovered. Investigation found that the school had been entered by forcing a door on the west side of the building. Once inside a fire was started in the kindergarten room.

The youths are described as being between the ages of 13 and 16 years. Two appeared to be about 5-ft. tall and the third a little taller. One youth was wearing a

blue jacket with red on the shoulders.

These youths are wanted for questioning as they had been observed in the area of the school where the fire originated, shortly before the fire was discovered.

Region OKs commercial lot levies

After years of debate, Halton Region is expected to impose a \$9,409 per acre lot levy on commercial and industrial land today (Wednesday).

Halton's administration and finance committee approved the lot levy last week but the implementation date is yet to be determined.

Lot levies are fees landowners must pay to Halton to help pay for the costs of sewers, water, roads, waste disposal, police, hospitals and administration which accompanies new development. In theory, lot levies ensure that existing taxpayers don't pay for new development.

The committee had proposed to make the lot levies retroactive to Oct. 19, with three industrial subdivisions signed since that date paying only 50 per cent of the levies.

But the committee deferred that recommendation until today.

Commercial and industrial lot levies have been a controversial topic at Halton for many years. In the early 1980s, the Region proposed commercial and industrial lot levies but politicians held off, fearing a huge decline in development due to the economic recession.

However, a report by finance commissioner Joe Rinaldo last week said "the implementation of the lot levy should not have a significant negative impact on the marketability and development of commercial-industrial lands."

Justifying the lot levies Mr. Rinaldo said, "Given the financial constraints Halton faces over the next five to 10 years, commercial-industrial capital contributions will be crucial for Halton to be able to construct the necessary infrastructure needed to develop these lands."

Developers have consistently fought the levies claiming they will turn investers away from the Region because land will become too expensive to develop.

An Orangeville man suspected of exposing himself to teenage girls in Georgetown will face three charges of indecent exposure, say Halton Regional Police.

The Orangeville man, 25, was arrested Feb. 17 after police received tips from local residents.

The man is charged in connection with three separate incidents in the Georgetown area since January of this year.

A 13-year-old girl walking near Church and Main Streets in Acton reported that a male who was not wearing pants stepped out of a van around 11:30 a.m. Jan. 27, and allegedly masturbated in front of the girl.

Three days later, a man driving a brown, 1988 GMC van allegedly exposed himself to three female students at Centennial Middle School at Delrex Boulevard and Mountainview Road. The school principal called police after receiving a report from the girls.

On Feb. 15, a 13-year-old girl in Georgetown reported that a man who was not wearing pants jumped out of his vehicle and came toward her, around 3:40 p.m. This event occurred in the Norton Crescent-Delrex Boulevard area.



NOTICE OF PASSAGE OF A BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills has enacted By-law No. 89-12 to designate "the Acton Town Hall" at 19 Willow Street, Acton on property described as Part of Lot 37, Block 3, Registered Plan 31 (formerly Town of Acton) more particularly described as Part 1, Reference Plan 20R-6577, as being of architectural and historical interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act.

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The half was completed in 1883 and is a good example of the monumental style of the late 19th century architecture. The architectural significant features of the building include its monumental and symmetrical massing along the front and side elevations, its arched window openings, highlighted by decorative key end stones and moulded brick sides designed to resemble pilasters, its italianate style roof trim featuring wide eaves with heavy shaped wooden brackets; the arched and brick pilaster trimmed front doorway and its wooden, detailed belfry tower.

HISTORICAL REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The historical interest of the property lies chiefly in the fact that it was the focal centre of the Town of Acton until Regional Government, as it acted as the community centre for virtually all Town of Acton related functions and services.
