Moodie's taking nothing for granted

There's no over-confidence in the Oakville Blades camp despite the fact the club holds a 3-0 stranglehold on the Georgetown Raiders on the eve of game four of the best-of-seven Jr. B playoff series.

"The hardest team to beat is one with its back against the wall," said Oakville coach Ken Moodie on Monday. "It'll be a tough game."

Moodie was pleasantly surprised to be up 3-0 on Georgetown after last weekend's action although his club dominated the Raiders during the regular season (six wins, one loss).

"To be up 3-0 is great," he said.
"The fact of the matter is we didn't
have as good a regular season as
last year. We've played like worldbeaters some nights and others
we've been blown out."

Meanwhile, the Kevin Alcock controversy hasn't hurt the club in the least. Alcock was suspended prior to playoffs by the Blades in a disciplinary measure and isn't likely to return.

Moodie said Oakville wouldn't re-instate the 1988-89 west division MVP under the present circumstances, even if Oakville started to falter in the playoffs.

"I can't see that happening (reinstating Alcock)," said Moodie.
"It's not a matter of how well we do. It's a matter of principle. Win or lose we'll have our principles. If we were up 3-0 or down 0-3 we weren't going to compromise."

Backup goalie Glen Martin has stepped in and played well for Oakville in Alcock's absence. "I'm really pleased with his play," said Moodie.

It's do or die for Raiders now

Do or die. Backs against the wall. Now or never.

Go ahead. Pick your cliche.

They all apply to the Georgetown
Raiders.

Raiders head into Oakville tonight down 3-0 in their best-of-seven Central Ontario Jr. B Hockey League quarter-final series with the Blades and suddenly what's been a turnaround season is on the brink of disaster.

"It's do or die, no doubt about it," said a disappointed Peter Sturgeon after his Raiders dropped a 7-4 decision to the Blades in game three at Alcott Arena on Saturday night.

That win followed a double overtime 7-6 Oakville triumph in Oakville on Friday after a seriesopening 7-5 victory by the Blades in Georgetown last Thursday night.

"There's not many positive things to say," continued Sturgeon after Saturday's disheartening loss in game three, one that the Raiders felt obliged to win after Friday's well-played (albeit losing) effort. "We lost our concentration early in the game. The reffing is no excuse, you've got to want to win in the playoffs. The will to win has got to be bigger than anything else. We didn't have it."

Although minor penalties were fairly even in Saturday's tilt (18 minutes for Oakville, 14 for Georgetown), referee Bob Morley's style definitely favored the clutch-and-grab Blades. Morley called mainly offsetting minors and the frustration of Oakville's close-checking game plan was evident on the

Georgetown bench.
Sturgeon, however, wasn't prepared to blame anyone outside of the Raider organization for the Raiders 0-3 series plight.

"When you're in a situation like that (down 0-2) you've got to dig in," he said.

Raiders bounced back from a sixth-place finish last year to end up in fourth spot at the conclusion of the 1988-89 regular schedule, finishing a full seven points ahead of fifth-place Oakville. Despite Oakville's mastery over the Raiders during the regular season (six wins in seven meetings) Georgetown was looking forward to avenging last year's four-game playoff sweep at the hands of the

But tonight survival is more important than revenge and Sturgeon is maintaining a positive attitude.

"It's their (Raiders) decision if they want to come out of this series with pride," said Sturgeon. "It's never over 'til it's over. This is a good hockey team, and if everyone comes together who knows?"

Alcock's absence blessing in disguise for Blades?

The Oakville Blades are in the driver's seat and GM Murray Walker doesn't foresee any mechanical problems as the team heads into tonight's fourth game with a 3-0 lead in its best-of-seven Jr. B playoff tussle with Georgetown Raiders.

"It's one of those situations, unless we really go for a nosedive we should wrap it up," said Walker on Monday.

In the wake of what was supposed to be a battle between star goaltender Kevin Alcock and an explosive Georgetown offence, Walker was crediting Oakville's buzzsaw checking game which has frustrated the Raiders in three straight wins.

"We try to play each team differently," said Walker. "We forecheck well, we're a bunch of buzzers."

A pre-playoff suspension to Alcock, for disciplinary reasons, meant the much-awaited confrontation between the Central league's west division MVP and the Raider offensive machine has not materialized. But rather than hurt Oakville, as many suspected, Walker feels the absence of Alcock has actually relped the Blades.

"Everybody counted us out but it's turned out to be just the thing we needed," he said. "As a result of letting Kevin go we've had to dig deeper. Glen Williams (Oakville backup who has played all three games) has played well. The kids understood why we suspended Kevin and they've actually been positive about it."

Walker admitted he was worried during Friday's double overtime win by Oakville at home.
"When Loreto had that
breakaway I said it was all over
but the crying," said Walker,
referring to a clear-cut scoring
chance by the Georgetown super
sniper in the sudden death period.
"But Glen stopped him with a
save you would expect Alcock to
make."

With Oakville playing well Walker says he doesn't anticipate returning Alcock to the lineup.

"At this stage of the game I'd have to say no," he said. "Kevin has come to me on several occasions lately. It's the story of his life. He could've been playing pro. But he's feeling it. He's a likeable kid, you can't dislike him. But I told him he's got to

make his peace with the coach (Oakville's Ken Moodie)."
