Blood donations down

The Red Cross fell slightly short of a projected 325 units of blood at the clinic held in Holy Cross Church Feb. 13.

The clinic brought in 336 donors for a total 307 units of blood, according to statistics released by the Red Cross. But organizers feel there was a good turnout at Monday's afternoon and evening clinic.

"The attendance was great," said co-chairman of blood clinics Erica thompson. Mrs. Thompson added that the amount of blood collected was "a very good collection for this time of year. Cold and flu season really does make a difference," she said.

May is usually the best time to attract donors, she said.

The Blood Donation Safety Form seen by Georgetown donors for the first time Monday did not slow things down despite fears that it might, said Mrs. Thompson.

The questionnaire, which contains a separate section on the AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) virus "puts into writing the questions already ask-

The questionnaire is filled out in cubicles that look like "voting booths" and the information is kept confidential, said Mrs. Thompson.

The health information can be useful to determine not only who should give blood, but whether the donor will contribute all his blood or a blood product from part of his blood.

This month's blood donor clinic was sponsored by the Optimists Club of Georgetown. 


