## Zone ahead

It's still a neck-and-neck battle for top spot in the Georgetown Ladies Basketball League with the Blue Zone maintaining a half-game lead over the Pacemakers.

Both sides won on Feb. 22 with the Blue Zone topping the 76ers 58-50 and the Pacemakers thumping the Steroids 59-30. The other league contest saw the Celtics best the California Raisins, 64-50.

Judy Thompson had 19 points for the Blue Zone in its win with Chung Kim leading the Sixers with a game-high 22 points, Anita Stankus paced the Pacemakers with 27 points and Lorraine Capreol had 10 for the 'Roids. Celtics' top gunner was Michelle Miehm with 34 points and the Raisins got 16 from Susan Thorn.

In Feb. 15 league action, the Zone zapped the Celtics 71-39, Pacemakers edged the California Raisins 43-42 and the Steroids blasted the 76ers, 60-37.

The Blue Zone got 22 points from Sandy Brownridge with Michelle Miehm nailing 24 for the Celts, Anita Stankus had 19 points for the Pacemakers and Susan Thorn had 20 for the Raisins, the 'Roids received 22 points from Linda Capreol and Chung Kim set the Sixer offence with 15.

# Jr. B history repeated as Oakville sweeps Raiders

History repeated itself last Wednesday night for the Georgetown Raiders as the Oakville Blades eliminated the local Jr. B team from Central Ontario league playoffs in four straight games for the second season in a row.

A 7-5 comeback overtime win at Oakville Arena gave the Blades their second sweep of Georgetown in as many seasons and left Raider coach Peter Sturgeon wondering aloud what the local club had to do to beat its nemesis.

"I'm really disappointed with the loss," lamented Sturgeon after Wednesday's series-ending loss. "I thought with our offence we could win the series. Tonight I thought we played well enough for a win. We took it to them, but they wanted it bad too."

It was arguably Georgetown's best outing in the best-of-seven quarter-final set as the Raiders held a 5-3 lead at the end of two periods. But four unanswered Oakville goals, including the winner in a regulation 10-minute overtime period, and an insurance empty-netter, spelled an early

playoff exit for the second straight year for Georgetown.

Greg Brazeau scored two goals for Georgetown with K.C. Foster, Davin Ciglen and Des Brown also scoring.

Oakville, which beat the Raiders six out of seven times during the regular season despite finishing one position below them in the final league standings, had earlier



recorded series wins of 7-5, 7-6 (OT) and 7-4.

"I thought we finished off the first period strong," said Oakville coach Ken Moodie. "But we gave Georgetown credit, they came out flying."

The home ice advantage in Wednesday's game at Oakville Arena definitely had a hand in Oakville's series-clincher as Moodie was able to capitalize in a

line-matching battle with Sturgeon that saw the Blades effectively shut down high-scoring Chuck Loreto.

"We came out on top of the line combinations," admitted Moodie. "We were lucky to have the home ice change. It worked to our advantage."

A first period change that resulted in Oakville's removal of starting goaltender Glen Williams also did nothing to harm the Blades. Williams, who in the aftermath of the Blades' pre-playoff suspension of west division MVP Kevin Alcock, had started and played well in all three previous Oakville wins, was burned early on Wednesday for four Raider goals.

Moodie lifted Williams at 13:00 of period one and backup Chris Lovisa came in to almost bar the door completely on Georgetown, allowing only one goal over the remainder of the game.

"We wanted to shake things up, change the pace," said Moodie of the goalie switch. "Glen didn't get much support. Lovisa played well."

Oakville's intense forechecking game also stifled Georgetown, much as it had in the three previous wins. "They were coming up the middle so we worked a little

harder as the game went on," said Moodie. "We gave up a shorthanded goal (Des Brown), which was a killer, but our powerplay was good."

Moodie considered the success of the Blades powerplay on Wednesday (three goals) to be a pleasant surprise. "It wasn't that good during the regular season," he said.

Fresh off the Georgetown win, Moodie was frank in discussing the Blades' chances against west division champion Etobicoke Capitals in Oakville's semi-final round which begins tomorrow in Etobicoke.

"We'll have to have everything going for us," he said. "We'll have to change how we attack them, they move the puck up so well. We'll try some new things."

Oakville took only one point from Etobicoke during the regular season, picking up a tie and suffering six losses in seven meetings with the Caps.

#### GETTING RECORDS TOGETHER

QUESTION: I have all my T4s together. I received \$100 in interest from a bank but I have not received a T5 from them. Must I wait until I get this T5 before I can file my return?

ANSWER: No. It is not necessary to file a copy of your T5 with your tax return, although you should do so if you have one. The T5 is an information statement which tells you the amount of interest reported to the federal government and paid to your account during the year. It is a good idea, however, to verify the amount with the bank in order to ensure that it agrees with their record.
