 There's no disappointment in the Georgetown Rebels senior girls volleyball camp despite the fact the team was swept in two straight games at the GHAC final in Milton on Wednesday.

tough Hamilton-Brebeuf side in the GHAC final and according to Georgetown coach Bevin Clarke, the Rebels were simply outclassed.

"They're a very strong team," said Clarke of the Brebeuf squad. "They were good enough to force us not to play our best."

Brebeuf smoked the Rebels to the tune of 15-8 and 15-7 in the final match after Georgetown had cruised

ed to the championship round after sweeping aside Westdale in two straight games.

"They're a well-oiled offensive machine and they're good defensively," added Clarke, continuing on his summation of the Brebeuf team. "They almost seemed more experienced." Indeed, reports indicated that the Hamilton school's senior side has been playing together - in high school and at the club level - for about six years.

Wednesday's final was Georgetown's first experience at the "AAA" level after competing for years in the "AA" category. "Keeping that in perspective, we've had a good season," said Clarke.

Meanwhile, Clarke is anticipating an even stronger senior side next season as he loses only three starters. Almost the entire Rebel junior team, which also won Halton gold on Monday, will move up to senior competition and Clarke says it will be tough to decide his starting lineup. But it's the kind of tough position coaches welcome.

"As much as we were a good team this year, we should be even better next year," he said.

Clarke credited the spirit of the Georgetown bench throughout the season for helping his Rebels reach Halton gold and the GHAC final berth. "We used about seven of 13 girls at GHAC and the rest provided a lot of team spirit," he said. "As far as I'm concerned that's crucial."

The Rebel coach also cited his assistant, Andreas Schirm, for helping develop senior setters and for, "being instrumental in our growth." Schirm, a Grade 12 student at GDHS and an accomplished spiker himself, will return next year.

Leaving the Rebel seniors next season are graduating players Tara Burroughs (co-captain), Shanna Long and Kyla Drever.

Burroughs is likely to have a decision or two on her hands when she considers a collegiate future next fall. The Grade 13 student has heard college offers from the U.S. as a result of her athletic accomplishments in volleyball, basketball and track.
